TELLS OF HAVOC BIG GERMAN GUNS

Desolation of Belgium and Dumb Terror of Refugees Most Pathetic Sight of War.

Adrian C. Duff, staff photographer for the American Press Association, has just returned from the European war zone, where he obtained many interesting pictures of the great struggle.

By ADRIAN C. DUFF. I LEFT New York Aug. 15 on the Saxonia of the Cunard line. From Liverpool I went to London, to Ostend and then into Antwerp, where I put up at the Hotel San Antonio.

Termonde has suffered the most. It has been the scene of four battles. When I first saw Termonde it was a thriving little city. When I last saw it not a house was standing. The ruin was complete.

Makes Pictures in Antwerp. I made my way to Paris and returned to London, where I sent the additional pictures I had accumulated. I then returned to Ghent. I tried hard

German Atrocities Doubtful.

In all my travels through Belgium I failed to witness any of the so-called German atrocities. It was impossible to substantiate any of the wild stories that were told. I am convinced that they are all fakes.

There has been much said of the suffering in the war, but the real sufferers are the poor Belgians. I have seen every section of Belgium at close range, and it is simply impossible to tell in cold words the woe and desolation of that unhappy country.

From Antwerp I went to Ghent, where I got my first good pictures. After the battle of Melle I went out on the battlefield. In one section of the city forty houses had been burned.

Warns American Consul. Before the Germans opened fire on Antwerp General von Beseler asked Brand Whitlock, the American minister, to ride through the lines and make a list of the buildings in the city which he considered should be spared from fire.

to get into Antwerp before its fall. I tried six different roads and was held up each time. I was told that I would be shot if I persisted. I was in Ghent when the English and Belgians retreated into that city.

When the Germans marched into Ghent the first thing that suggested itself was the question "Where do they all come from?" There was a never ending procession. They marched as one man. When I got into Antwerp I found that it was not badly damaged.

"Tell Diederick, the American consul there, he'd better get out," Von Beseler said to Whitlock. "When we start on Antwerp it will be hell." Diederick has a daughter, to whom he is much attached. She has a weak

Refugees Objects of Pity.

One of the saddest sights of the war is the flight of Belgian refugees. You meet them everywhere on the road. They are dazed—like people in a dream.

Another thing that impressed me was the anxiety of German officers, high and low, to get expressions of opinion from the United States. Whenever any press comment favorable to Germany found its way into the German camp it was translated and big circulars printed and posted on the walls where the German soldiers could read it.

The khaki uniform of the English soldiers is the nastiest in the war. The dull gray of the Germans is the hardest to see in battle while the bright red of the French troops provides a shining mark in the war.
