Niagara Share Nets 25 Cents a Share in 1941

Company Earned 36 Cents in 1940; Assets Decline but Earned Surplus Improves; President J. F. Schoellkopf Jr. Explains Redemption Policy in Annual Report

Net income of the Niagara Share Corporation for 1941 amounted to \$516,069, equal after dividends on the preferred stock to approximately 25 cents a share on the class B common stock, the annual report released yesterday disclosed.

This compares with net income of \$691,957, equal to 36 cents a share in 1940.

Earned Surplus Improves
Earned surplus at the close of the year amounted to \$1,348,241 against \$1,272,479 the previous year. Unrealized depreciation in the value of investments, based on cost increased \$1,955,311 during 1941.

Referring to the dip in 1941 income President J. F. Schoellkopf, Jr. said, "in spite of increases of dividends on many of the stocks owned by your corporation, the omission by Niagara Hudson Power Corporation of the dividend on its common stock and the reduction in the amount of the dividend received on the preferred stock of Schoellkopf, Hutton & Pomeroy, Inc., more than offset these increases."

Explains Policy
Explaining the redemption policy Mr. Schoellkopf declared "It is intended that the corporation will continue to purchase its outstanding debentures and preferred and common stocks at such times, at such prices, and in such amounts as the board of directors may deem advisable." He added "no substantial changes were made in the corporation's investments during the year." The large investments continue in the securities of Niagara Oil Corporation, Schoellkopf, Hutton & Pomeroy and Niagara Hudson.
