Blaze Raged For 45 Minutes and Flames Shot Above Dome

Washington, D. C., Jan. 3—Fire blazed for more than 30 minutes tonight about the dome of the Capitol of the United States. Originating in the room of a Capitol artist, it damaged the documents of the house and sent flames shooting toward the great figure of Liberty on its top, while thousands within the great parkways stood by in fear that the historical building would be destroyed. More than twenty fire companies were called upon to fight the stubborn blaze which at first smoldered beneath the roof and then broke through to shoot shafts of reddish hue into the air. The blaze could be plainly seen all along Pennsylvania avenue and from the White House itself, where a Christmas eve blaze burned President Hoover's executive offices.

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Winter Held Sway Most of December

Additional proof—if any were needed—that last month was decidedly more wintry than December a year ago is furnished in the monthly meteorological report just prepared by the weather bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Winter Held Sway Most of December

Nearly three times the snowfall of December 1928 characterized last month, the mean—or average—temperature was but 21.3 degrees last month as compared to 32 degrees in the corresponding month a year ago, and there was only one all clear or sunny day out of the entire thirty-one, that being December 30. However, there were seven more days that were partly clear, but the remainder failed to provide even a slight glimpse of Old Sol's beaming countenance. Also there were only eight days on which there was no snow or rain.
