

SMITH WILL DISPOSES OF \$4,000,000 ESTATE

Prohibition Agents Seize \$2,500 Worth of Whiskey; Make Two Arrests

BULK OF FORTUNE LEFT BY MRS. SMITH GOES TO CHILDREN

Mrs. Flora Smith Maeks Many Charitable Bequests, amounting to \$26,000—Friends Are Given \$70,000.

Charitable bequests amounting to \$26,000, gifts to friends totaling \$70,000 and a balance of \$1,000,000 to her children, Mrs. Flora Smith Maek, widow of Lyman Smith, died for probate with Surrogate John W. Sadler Monday afternoon.

WILL EXECUTED IN 1917.
While the petition for probate filed by Burns Lyman Smith, William A. McKenzie and Lewis P. Smith as executors, states that the value of the real and personal property of the testatrix is, conservatively, estimated to be in excess of \$1,000,000. Attorneys Cobb, MacKeezie and Smith appear as attorneys for the testatrix.

The will was executed February 9, 1917, and was witnessed by May Buehr and Attorney Basil B. Ayres. It provided for the immediate payment of the present money a few days before the testatrix's death, makes three additional cash bequests to Syracuse beneficiaries, but does not mention the principal provisions of the will.

Made 31 Cash Presents.
Known throughout her life as a generous contributor to worthy charitable enterprises, a friend of the poor and needy and a giver whose gifts were never marked with ostentation or display, she bestowed 31 cash presents for a total of \$135,000 in her will, outside of clauses that are here and there mentioned in the present money a few days before the testatrix's death, makes three additional cash bequests to Syracuse beneficiaries, but does not mention the principal provisions of the will.

Son is Given Half.
One half of the entire residue of her estate, wherever situated, is left to her son, Burns Lyman Smith. One half of the residue of the estate, situated outside the state of New York is given outright to her daughter, Flora B. Smith.

Trusts for Children.
The Smith, one of the executors, and the Union Trust Company of New York City are named as trustees of this trust fund. They are directed to invest the principal of the trust fund until she reaches the age of 50 years.

Bequests to Friends.
After attaining the full century mark, the daughter, Flora, is to be paid \$5,000 annually from the principal of the trust fund for the remainder of her life. If she dies before her children, the trust is to go to her children, if any, and in the event of no issue the trust fund is to be divided equally among the children of the testatrix.

Bequests to Friends.
The foregoing trust fund provisions reads one clause of the will, "I have been moved by the most urgent desire, to protect my daughter in an emergency that may arise and to insure her a source of livelihood and comfort in the event of my death."

Large Stock Holdings.
Large stock holdings in the Syracuse Malleable Iron Works, securities of unspecified value, two modern residences in the city and one in Washington, mercantile district.

Former Syracusean, Dies.
William H. Stanfield, at one time one of the best known business men in Syracuse, former president of the Erie Springs National Bank, and a member of the firm of Stanfield & Co., died Sunday night at 11:30 p. m. at the St. Vincent's Hospital where he had been suffering from pneumonia since Sunday night in New York where he had made his home for the last four years.

Clarendon st. hill, the steep hill in the city for its length, was opened to traffic Sunday after being paved.

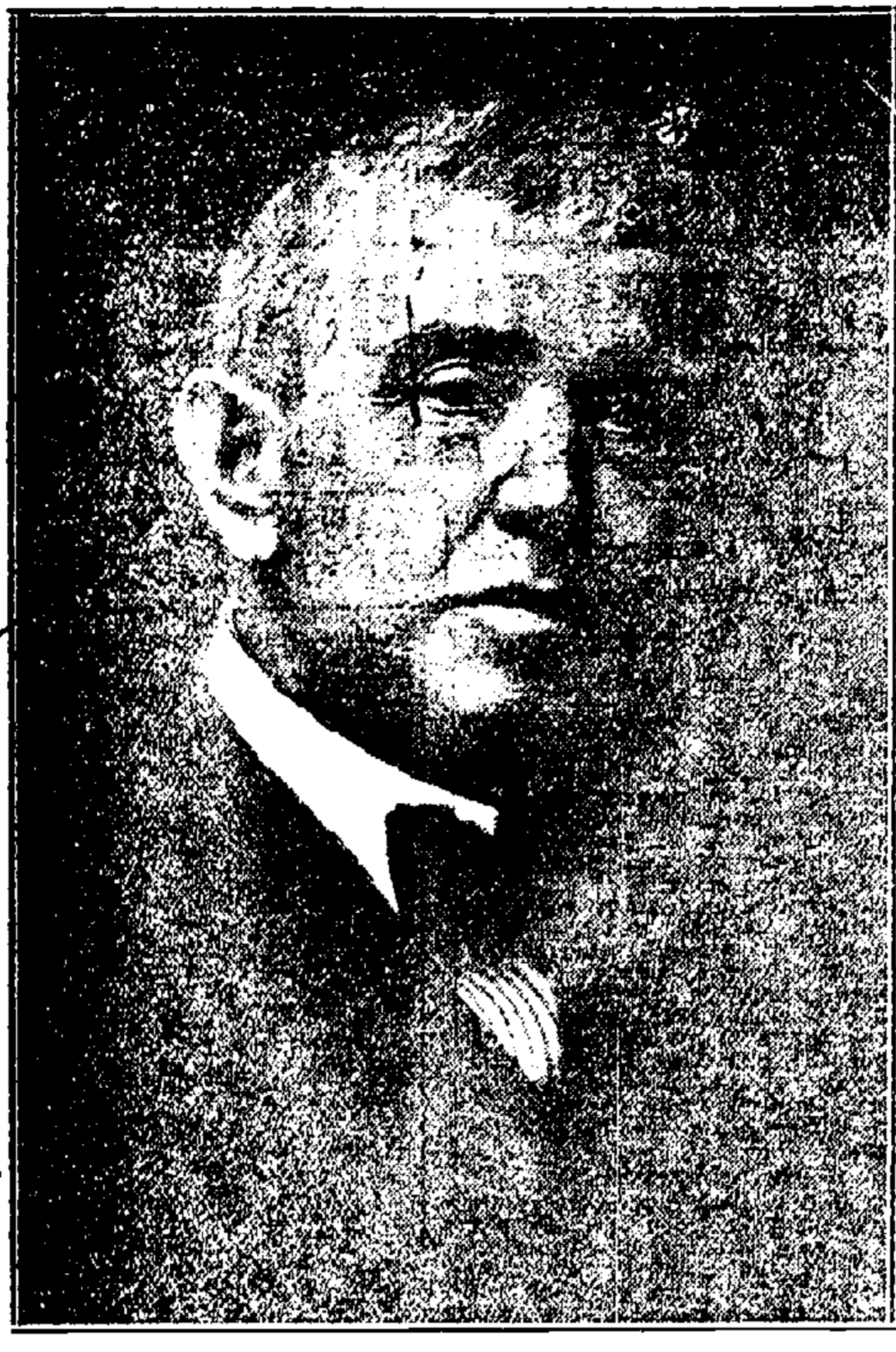
