SERIOUS STRIKE IN PARIS

Three Million Letters and 200,000 Telegrams are Held Up.

Paris, March 17.—The strike of the postmen and telegraphers continues to spread in Paris and the provinces and although organized and demoralized, no branch of the service is completely paralyzed.

It is estimated that 3,000,000 letters and 200,000 telegrams are held up awaiting delivery. As a result business interests are suffering heavy losses. The telephone service has been only partly suspended.
