BUILDINGS NAMED AFTER GOV. FLOWER

MARK OF RESPECT AT ST. LAW- RENCE STATE HOSPITAL RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR BEING

When Group Burned in 1902, Gov. Flower Sent Encouraging Message to the Legislature Calling for \$181,000 to Replace Structures... As a mark of respect to the memory of the late Gov. Russell P. Flower of Watertown the name of the portion of the St. Lawrence State hospital buildings at Uglensburg known as Group Three, has been changed by the board of managers to the "Russell P. Flower Group." The people of Uglensburg hold the memory of the late governor in their affection because of the part he played in rebuilding Group Three when it burned on the morning of March 3, 1893. The same day the board of managers hurried by Albany and conferred with Gov. Flower. The same day he sent an emergency message to the legislature, calling upon it to appropriate the sum of \$18,000 to replace the burned structure. It was promptly done by both houses and the governor put his name to the law two days after the fire. The board of managers also has changed the name of the Infirmary to the "William Pryor Letchworth Group" in honor of the man who as chairman of the commission that was appointed to select a site for the hospital, did so much to have Uglensburg chosen. He and the late Dr. W. E. who was the first superintendent of the new hospital were the only two of the five commissioners who favored Uglensburg, the others being from Plattsburg. Two reports were filed with the legislature but the minority one was adopted.

HUSBAND AND WIFE STRUGGLE OVER GUN

WOMAN IS STRUCK BY CHARGE OF SHOT MRS. LA PATRA LOSES EYE

As the result of a struggle between Mr. and Mrs. Fred LaPatra of Natural Bridge over a shot gun Thursday morning, Mrs. LaPatra is in a critical condition at the City hospital. The gun was discharged during the scuffle and Mrs. LaPatra received the charge in the face and the right eye. The story as told by Mr. LaPatra is that he wanted to go hunting Thursday morning and his wife objected. He asserted, however, that he would go. Taking his gun he started for the door. Mrs. LaPatra seized the gun and in the struggle it was accidentally discharged. Part of the contents of the gun, which was loaded with birdshot, scattered and entered her face, more particularly on the right side. The right eye was pierced by the shot. Help was at once called and after an examination was made by physicians at that village it was found necessary to bring her to this city. At the City hospital Thursday afternoon Dr. Gilbert D. Greger of this city performed an operation, removing the right eye. The shot was light and the skull was not pierced. Mr. LaPatra came to the City hospital this morning and was not allowed to see his wife, being told, however, that he might see her this afternoon. He is very much disturbed over the affair, which seems to have been simply a bad accident.

This arrangement will at rest all rumor and speculation that has been rife that the engine company would next spring take the quarters on Beebe's Island that the brake shop is to vacate. Mr. Johnson stated that no improvements or alterations would be made in the buildings now occupied by the engine company other than necessary repairs that will have to be made from time to time. The present site is an advantageous one for the engine company as it has good railroad facilities and the buildings have been altered from time to time to meet the needs of the company.

RED CROSS STAMPS NOV. 15

Anti-Tuberculosis Society and Visiting Nurse Association Will Share Equally in Proceeds. Word has been received by Eli W. Herrick, chairman of the local committee for the prevention of tuberculosis, that the Red Cross seals, which are sold in this city every year, will be sent out Nov. 15 and that there will be an energetic campaign for their sale this winter. There will be about the usual number sent to this city, and the same places that had them last year will conduct the sale this winter. DENES ROSENSTEIN STOLE HER HEART

Mrs. Thomas E. Dailey Says Her Husband Was Cruel to Her. Mrs. Thomas E. Dailey, who has been named in an alienation suit brought by her husband against Samuel Rosenstein, junk dealer, made the following statement today: "My husband brought Rosenstein to the house to board when we lived on Coffey street. About six weeks ago my husband left me and I moved downtown, getting a room in Court street. Since that time Rosenstein has been a regular boarder with me, paying \$4.50 a week. Last fall my husband chased me out of the house with a butcher knife while he was drunk. I have been married seven years and have supported my husband all that time. Last winter he one day five days and a half. He was drunk all the time and I couldn't live with him. One night he came home drunk and threw a lighted lamp into the bed and smashed it, but the light went out before it struck the bed. Mrs. Dailey is about 35 years of age and a native of the Charlot Lake district of Canada. She married Mr. Dailey seven years ago at Cape Vincent.

FEWER ACCIDENTS ON THE RAILROAD

A committee composed of 15 men was organized the first day of the year on each of the divisions of the New York Central. The committee's main object is to reduce the number of accidents on each month and recommend any changes in any department of the road that might result in fewer accidents. They pay special attention to their home division and investigate and recommend changes for dangerous crossings, transfer places, etc. On the St. Lawrence division, Division Superintendent William Wilson was made chairman and since the formation of the committee many changes have been brought about which it is believed have prevented accidents.

George H. Bradshaw 30 RE-PORTS TO LOCAL DIVISION

A letter received at Superintendent Williamson's office in the New York Central general offices this morning from George H. Bradshaw, general safety agent of the New York Central Lines, states that during the past six months there have been but 68 casualties on the entire New York Central system. This is a decrease of 20 per cent as compared with the same period of time last year and decreases below any record ever kept since the road has had its present trackage. The decrease is accounted for by the fact that during the past six months each division of the road has been benefited by the work of "safety committees."
