JUSTICE CROUCH ELECTED BY 10,000

THE DEMOCRATIC PROGRESSIVE NOMINEE NAMED

BIG VOTE IN ONONDAGA COUNTY

Jefferson County Gave Lewis 7,535 and Crouch 8,800—Onondaga and Herkimer Go For Crouch. The principles of non-partisan judicial were maintained in the Fifth judicial district Tuesday and Justice Leonard C. Crouch of Syracuse, the fusion candidate on the Democratic and Progressive tickets, was elected over Caylor H. Lewis, the Republican candidate. Jefferson county gave Mr. Lewis a plurality of less than 1,000. The plurality of Justice Crouch in the district was between 10,000 and 11,000. With five districts missing in Jefferson county, the returns give Lewis 7,535 and Crouch 8,800. Crouch's victory comes through his magnificent showing in Onondaga county, in that county, complete, he received 25,240 votes, while Mr. Lewis received only 17,093. Justice Crouch carried Herkimer county by an estimated plurality of 1,000 while he swept Onondaga county by a plurality of 8,576. Mr. Lewis carried Oswego county by an estimated plurality of 1,300. In Lewis county, with three districts missing, Crouch has a plurality of 180 votes.

"PROGRESSIVES ARE GOING BACK TO REPUBLICANISM"

STATEMENT OF A. B. PARKER

Republican City Chairman Says That He Considers the Republican Organization Treated Democrats With Great Fairness.

"I don't know that there is much that I can say about the election, except that I am very much pleased with the way that it went," said Addison B. Parker, chairman of the Republican committee today. "In regard to the charge made by the Democrats that we were unfair, I wish to say that I do not see where they had any grounds for such a statement. I think that we treated the Democrats very chastely and very fairly. We could have done a whole lot worse to them than we did. What there is a Republican city and what there is a favorable candidate, with the proper kind of work, the result is sure to be Republican. I think we had an exceptionally good city organization. Everything was harmonious and all of the committeemen and party workers did their best. I am pleased with the work that they did and they are entitled to a lot of credit. I am also deeply gratified with the treatment accorded by the newspapers. They were all perfectly fair. "I think that a comparison of the vote shows that the Progressives are going back to the Republican ranks. The election yesterday showed that 75 per cent of the Progressives voted back. In 1912 the Progressive vote in the city amounted to 366 while the largest Progressive vote yesterday was 275. On the other hand there has been a slump in the Socialist vote in the city of about 200 since 1911." Archie C. Ryder, chairman of the Republican county committee, stated that taking the count of appeals votes as a basis, two-thirds of the Progressives in the county, outside of Watertown, had come back and taking the assembly fight as a basis, only 50 per cent of the Socialist vote was cast for VanBroeklin and Crabb.

ELECTION OFFICIALS PROMPT IN FILING

ALL OF THE CITY TALLY SHEETS IN HANDS OF COMMISSIONERS BY 8:30 P. M.

At 8:30 Tuesday evening all of the returns from the city had been delivered to the election board of the city in the court house. Early this morning election officials began coming in with the ballots, books, tally sheets and other material from the towns and by night the entire county election result is expected to be in the hands of the commissioners. The returns were brought in very promptly and Commissioner of Election Moore himself was well pleased with the haste shown by the various district boards. As soon as the complete returns are received Commissioners Moore and Crotty will begin the canvass of the votes, taking first the county and town tickets. The law provides that they cannot be finished when the board of supervisors convenes next Monday to permit its committee to get immediate aid at its work. After the supervisors have canvassed the returns the result is to state officers must be forwarded to Albany. Should the state officials fail to get the report by the last day of November a special envoy will be sent after the returns. The election commissioners are directed to send in the returns to Albany within five days after the supervisors have finished. With the result of election completed, the commissioners will undertake the work of compiling the enrollment. This is a hard task, covering both city and county. It is probable that in accordance with the request of the Republican county committee, the enrollment will be printed in pamphlet form as it has been in the past. The law as a present does not require the commissioners to have the enrollment printed, leaving the decision optional with them. The county election board does not canvass the election result as to city and county.

CROWDED HOUSE HEARS ORCHESTRA

RUSSIAN SYMPHONY'S FIRST APPEARANCE HERE

HIGH PRAISE FOR MUSICIANS

Morning Musicals is Congratulated Upon Having Brought Celebrated Orchestra to Watertown. Not since the Pittsburgh orchestra, under Emil Paur, gave us such a delightful evening in the armory seven years ago, has Watertown been favored with a grand orchestral concert, until Tuesday evening, at the opera house. The Russian Symphony orchestra, under Modest Altschuler, made its first appearance in northern New York. In the matter of the program the writer confesses to the usual feeling of disappointment, as the most Russian music, especially that of the extremely modern Russian school, does not appeal to him, but, this, more soon. The first number, the overture, "Miguel," was the best played, as far as technical finish is concerned. An analytical note of the program states, the composer, Tchaikovsky, "clearly the influence" of his fellow countryman Gounod. The whole overture was exceedingly well played, and being well known and well understood by many of the audience, was all the more enjoyed. "The Spanish Caprice" by the symphonist Rimsky-Korsakoff, while showing a certain amount of technical skill, was rather difficult to understand, though one could hardly fail being impressed with its unusual, even if bizarre, modulations and effects. The score to this was "Meditation" from Massenet's "Thais," the theme being given as a violin solo, by Mr. Altschuler's concertmaster, whose name is associated with the name of a playing was better than his fiddle. The collo playing of Mr. Bronard Altschuler—in a relative of the conductor—was greatly enjoyed. The not very well known Andante of Chopin, and the rather inconsequential number of Gilet, being given so acceptably that he was obliged to respond to an encore. The "Sant-Saens' 'Swan Song' delightfully. "The Enchanted Lake" by Laidoff was a little too learned, not to say modern, for most of us. We note that he is a professor in the conservatory, conducting special classes in harmony and composition, and perhaps there is where he belongs. The best known, undoubtedly, of all the Russian composers, and undoubtedly the most popular since Rimsky, who really was more german than Russian in his school, was Tchaikovsky. He was represented on this program by two numbers, the first the famous overture "1812" which represents the retreat of Napoleon from Moscow, and the other, the highest degree "program music," "It is exceedingly interesting and effective. This overture was played "con amore," by the orchestra and an encore was positively demanded, to which Mr. Altschuler responded with Dvorak's "Humoresque." It was a matter of disappointment that the whole in its representation by most famous symphony, the "Pathe-bard," as the "Nutsacker's Suite" hardly shows him at his best, interesting as it is as a bit of program music. Wagner was represented by the well known overture "Tannhauser." This wonderful bit of writing was much better played by the Paris orchestra seven years ago. The work of the strings in the Venus music being not particularly well done. However, it brought an encore and strange to say Mendelssohn's lovely "Spring Song" followed, although Wagner always looked upon Mendelssohn with contempt, and said that his music was "like water running out of a pump."
