CARTHAGE DOES NOT WANT FRESH AIRS

FEAR EPIDEMIC OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS FIFTY HAD BEEN EXPECTED

Dr. Metzger, Health Officer, and Rev. Perine, in Charge of Arrangements, Opposed to Entertaining New York Children.

Carthage, July 7.—Rev. R. B. Perine, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, who has charge of the local arrangements for the Fresh Air children from New York city, who were expected to arrive here Monday, July 17, stated last evening that he did not think that the children would now come to this village, because of the epidemic of infantile paralysis.

Dr. F. U. Metzger, local health officer, stated last evening that he did not think it would be wise to have the children come under the conditions existing in New York city.

Fifty of the children were expected here, practically the same number that were here last year. Nearly all of the people who took the children into their homes last year had offered to take them this year.

A few years ago there were quite a few cases of infantile paralysis here and there were a few fatalities. In the past three or four years there have been no cases of the disease here.

Farm Help Scarce.

Carthage, July 7.—The farmers in this vicinity are meeting with difficulty in securing men to assist them in haying. Good wages are being offered but few men can be secured. The hay crop will be the largest yield in years. Some of the farmers are afraid now that some of the hay will spoil before they can get it cut. The scarcity of farm labor has never been felt before in this section as it is this year. Farmers in general anticipate a small yield of grain. In some places the grain is just coming up. In some sections, due to the wet ground, the grain was not sown until last week.

Receives Suspended Sentence.

Carthage, July 7.—John Nidle, who was arrested by Chief of Police Race Wednesday evening, was arraigned in police court yesterday morning before Police Justice John R. Thorpe on the charge of public intoxication. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. The sentence was suspended.

PAZO DISCHARGED BY CARTHAGE COURT

MAN ACCUSED OF GRAND LARCENY IS FREED

PLAINTIFF FAILS TO APPEAR

William Forsythe, Who Charged Room-mate With Robbing Him, Not at Trial.

Carthage, July 7.—Joseph Pazo, accused of stealing a roll of bills, a watch and stick pin from his room-mate, William Forsythe, at the Levis House last Saturday night, was discharged on the motion of his attorney at a hearing held before Police Justice John R. Thorpe yesterday afternoon. Forsythe failed to appear, as did Andrew Roman, another witness for the people, and without these two men there was no evidence on which to convict. C. C. Johnson, of Watertown, represented the district attorney, and C. A. Meeker appeared for the defendant.

Pazo was arrested Sunday by Chief of Police Race, and was arraigned Monday before Justice Thorpe on the charge of grand larceny in the second degree. He pleaded not guilty and through his attorney demanded a hearing which was set down for yesterday afternoon. Pazo had been confined in the village jail from the time of his arrest until his discharge yesterday.
