RESIGNATION OF DR. FLETCHER ACCEPTED

MEMBERS OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH TAKE ACTION

Pastor Insists That Resignation Be Accepted - "Following Dictates of Judgment and Not of Heart."

The members of First Baptist church voted to accept the resignation

of Rev. Dr. Charles W. Fletcher as

pastor of the church at a meeting

Sunday noon following the morning

service. The resignation was consid-

ered only upon the clergyman's in-

stance that it should be. A com-

mittee was chosen to draft a resolu-

tion which will be tendered to Rev.

Dr. Fletcher some time today.

Following is the pastor's communi-

cation to the church which was

read before the resignation was

accepted: "To the First Baptist Church,

Watertown, N. Y.

"Dear Brethren:

"Last Monday I received your official

communication signed by H. B. Leak,

chairman of the board of trustees,

and by R. H. Gardner, clerk of the

church, in which the church's action

in declining to accept my resignation

was stated, and in which these words

occurred: "We most earnestly and

prayerfully urge you to continue with

us as our pastor."
