COSSACK RAIDERS

Russian Cavalry Column Lost Three Hundred.

JAPANESE WAR STORES SET ABLAZE

London, Jan. 17.—A telegram from Sakhalin states that General Mitschke's Russian cavalry column, consisting of five Japanese battalions, had been defeated near Tashiro, retreating northward and succeeded in regaining the Russian lines. Their losses were about 300 killed or wounded, all the latter being brought away.

The general reports in a dispatch to Emperor Nicholas that the Russian cavalry had suffered heavily. The Russian losses during those two days were three officers killed and ten wounded and five soldiers killed and forty-nine wounded.

The general also reports that the cavalry captured a quantity of stores and prisoners and says that the Japanese stores at Yinkow were set on fire and burned for nearly a whole night.

Late advices from the headquarters of the Third Japanese army at Port Arthur say that the victorious Japanese army has completely captured Port Arthur and that the Japanese of the city having been made, it is evident that the surrender was not necessary, as there were no effective men in the fortress at the time.

The supply of ammunition was short, but it was not exhausted. Food was scarce, but private stores were not requisitioned by the military.

There is no difficulty in getting good meals in the city even now from the stores in private possession.

A portion of the fortress was capable of defense for months longer. It was the opinion of the Japanese that the fortress would have held out for a long time, but the Japanese were not prepared to defend it.

General Stosoff was much blamed for what was characterized as a disgraceful conclusion of a splendid defense, which ended with the death of Major General Kudachenko, who was loved by the soldiers and was the life of the fortress.
