It is reported at Syracuse that John Taylor of Watertown will combine his efforts with the Beebe syndicate and construct a trolley line from Syracuse to Watertown. A portion of the route was constructed last year by the Beebe syndicate.

An effort is being made to secure signers to a petition requesting that the excise propositions be submitted to a vote at the Ira town meeting next month. The only licenses in force at the present time are those held by two hotels, the Curtis house of this place and the hotel at Ira. So far as can be learned no effort is being made to have propositions voted on in the town of Cato.

Quickly following the record high price of \$1.10 per 40 quart can of milk in December and the closing of the butter factory comes a marked decline in price. The first announcement was that the price would be reduced to \$1.05, but later this was changed to \$1.00 and the producers were requested to sign a statement to the effect that they were satisfied with the treatment accorded them by the Levy Dairy Company, the New York concern which handles the milk. The producers, quite naturally, declined this invitation and are considering the matter of disposing of their milk to other dealers.

The Ford automobile dealers of western New York started from Rochester, Tuesday, on their second mid winter tour of 500 miles. They passed through Webster, Sodas, Wolcott, Red Creek, Victory and reached Cato a little after four o'clock. Fay C. Adams, accompanied by E. J. Hapeman and Frank Briggs, ran to Wolcott and piloted the party to this place. There were 16 cars in line and these were joined later by two cars from Canandaigua which were delayed by snow drifts. Mr. Adams and W. M. Bush accompanied the party to Auburn, where the first days run ended. The remainder of the trip includes a tour of Cayuga, Seneca, Wayne, Ontario, Livingston and Genesee counties.

Stewart must have been burning the sacred midnight oil lately, if our many judge from the themes he has written on, or else he has an excellent imagination.

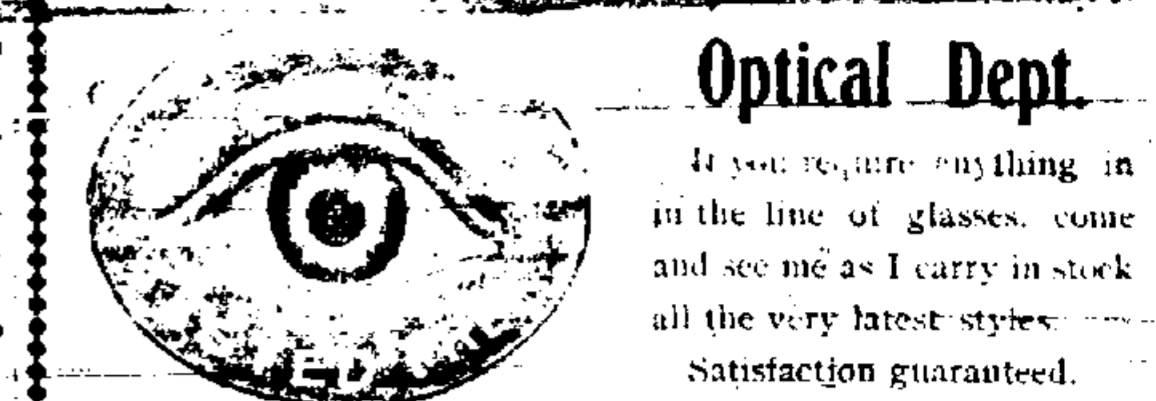
Installation and Presentation
