**SMITH SIGNS BONUS BILL**

N. Y. Vets to Get \$10 Month for Each Month Served—Limit \$150  
Machinery for the distribution of a bonus totaling \$45,000,000 to former service men and women in Albany was set in motion in Albany as Gov. Smith signed the bill which provides for the state's acknowledgement of military service during the World war.  
At the first meeting of the commission created by the bill to supervise distribution of the sum, Adjt. Gen. Westcott, one of its members, will present a plan of organization drafted by his officers. Application blanks now being printed will probably be ready to send to veterans by April 1, Gen. Westcott explained.  
Under the provisions of the new law, every veteran of the World war who enlisted from New York state, may receive the bonus—\$10 for each month he or she served, with the condition that the maximum shall be not more than \$150. Eligible to receive the payment are persons who enlisted in the military forces of the United States between April 6, 1917, and Nov. 11, 1918.

**NEGRO PURCHASED HOUSE**

Unable to Rent New York Apartment He Bought Structure for \$200,000  
James C. Thomas, a Cornell graduate and a negro assistant U. S. attorney, was unable to rent an apartment in a part of New York city where he desired to live with his wife and infant son, so he purchased a \$200,000 seven-story modern apartment house, he announced.  
It is occupied by white families and is fully three blocks from the nearest section of the Harlem "Black Belt."  
Thomas said he would make no changes in the tenant list, leaving the matter of future occupancy entirely in the hands of the families now living in the house.

**Fall in Dandelions Brings Her \$5,000**

Because the village of Ossining, N. Y., allowed dandelions, tall grass and weeds to grow over the edges of the sidewalk in front of Miss Frances Gettel's residence in Ossining, a jury in the supreme court at White Plains gave her a judgment of \$5,000 against the village for personal injuries received in a fall. Miss Gettel told the jury and Supreme Court Justice Morschauer it was the custom of city departments to cut the growth away from the sidewalk so people would not slip.

**Lackawanna Shops Fully Manned**

President Truesdale of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad informed Mayor Burdick of Scranton, Pa., that the Lackawanna shops are fully manned, that conditions on the road are normal and that the company contemplates no action regarding former employees. The communication was in reply to a letter sent by the mayor and city council, requesting a settlement of the shopmen's strike.

**Col. Forbes and Thompson Indicted**

Charles K. Forbes, former director of the U. S. Veterans' bureau, and John W. Thompson of Chicago and St. Louis were indicted by the federal grand jury in Chicago spent four weeks investigating the administration of Forbes. Charges that government funds were used for speculation by a government official and that certain sums of money were paid to two members of congress were contained in the special grand jury report.

**Yearly Mine Accidents Total 200,000**

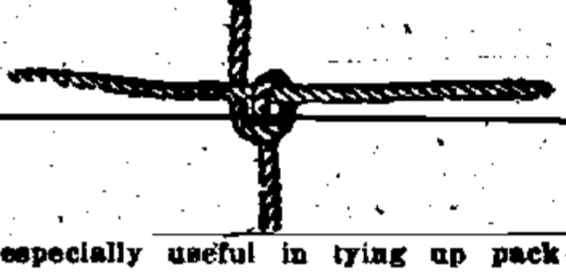

**BETTER NEW YORK FARMS and HOMES**

Laying Out Laying out an orchard the often gives the amateur considerable anxiety. There is no reason to be fastidious about this matter, for slight discrepancies in alignment will be impossible to detect by the time the orchard comes into bearing. However, sufficient care should be given a furrow at each row and setting the trees at the intersections, to actually having the land surveyed and a stake driven at the location of each tree. A method between these two extremes commends itself to the beginner who needs some definite plan of procedure. A base line is laid out on one side of the field parallel with some permanent landmark, such as a fence or a road. Stakes are placed along this line where the trees are to be planted. A similar line is now run at right angles to the first by the carpenter-square method, in which 9, 12 and 15 feet are the lengths of the sides of the right-angled triangle at the corner of the field. Having thus laid out the corner rows diverging at right angles it will now be possible to finish either by sighting or by measurement. By sighting and placing stakes at guides, it will be possible to establish parallel lines and to line up the rows. If the location of the trees is to be determined by measurement, two wires, with rings fastened in the ends, and of the same length as the trees are to be apart, are prepared. In laying out the field, the ring of one wire is placed over the stake of the first trees out from the corner on the other base line. The two free ends are now brought together and a stake is driven through the rings, marking the location of the second tree in the second row. The other trees can be located in a similar manner. As the trees are being planted they should be sighted for alignment.

The purpose of the cross crossinging hitch is to prevent hitch slipping at the crossing point of ropes or of twine, and is especially useful in tying up packages. It is so simple as to require no explanation. Anyone, by studying the accompanying picture for a minute, can easily learn to make it.



Making Dried Beef is usually made Dried from the round, although Beef any heavily muscled part may be used. The inside of the round makes the tenderest meat. In cutting meat for dried beef, the muscles should be separated into their natural divisions. When cured and smoked in this way they can be sliced across the grain and the meat is much tenderer than would otherwise be the case. A jar or a barrel is the best receptacle in which to pack the meat when curing it. To each 100 pounds of well-cooled beef weigh out 6 pounds of fine salt, 3 pounds of granulated brown sugar and 3 ounces of saltpeter. Mix these thoroughly, without wetting, and divide the mixture into three portions. Set two portions away for future use, and rub the other portion into the meat. Pack the meat in the jar and leave it for three days. At the end of three days take the meat from the jar, but leave in the jar the sirup that has formed. Rub the meat with another portion of the mixture, repack it, and leave it for three days. Remove it from the sirup, rub it with the past portion of the mixture, and repack it in the sirup in the jar. After three days remove the meat and hang it in the smokehouse, where it should be smoked until it is dry. It should then be kept in a dry place until it is used. The longer it is smoked and the drier it is kept, the longer it will remain good.

**NEWS BRIEFLY TOLD**

**Short Items from Various Parts of the World.**

Record of Many Happenings Condensed and Put into Small Space and Arranged With Special Regard for the Convenience of the Reader Who Has Little Time to Spare.  
A house resolution appropriating \$100,000 for the oil lease cases was passed by the senate.  
Charles B. Warren of Detroit has been nominated to be ambassador to Mexico.  
U S Senator Wadsworth, Jr. of New York, addressing the annual dinner of the Sons of the Revolution at New York, urged that the people of such state be given the right to affirm by referendum the action of their state legislature in ratifying federal constitutional amendments.  
Steve Walter shot and killed Miss Blanche Kell and her mother, Mrs. John Kell, and then committed suicide. It was stated at the sheriff's office in Lea Craes, N. M. Walter objected to Miss Kell keeping company with another youth.  
Canada's agricultural department will release 500,000 exercises, parasites imported from Massachusetts, May 1, to exterminate the corn borer.  
Couriers will ride to Washington on horseback in April to invite President Coolidge to attend the United Loyalist celebration in Belleville, Ont. in June.  
Orville Howelf, nine years old, shot to death his playmate, Jonas O'Neill, 12, during a quarrel over a game of marbles at Tarboro, S. C. He used a 22-calibre rifle. Trial has been ordered in juvenile court.  
President Coolidge told ranking Republican members of the house pensions committee that he was opposed to enactment at this time of any pension legislation involving any considerable drain on the public treasury.  
Harold Schwarm of New Britain, one time known as Prince Louis Henri De Chateroux De Bussigny De Bourbon, and as Reginald Van D'Ve, but known to the police as the "Dishrag Prince," was brought back to Hartford by detectives who found him in a cafe in Greenwich Village, New York.  
Three bandits broke their way into the Brooklyn warehouse of Bages & Wolf, furrers, wound and gagged the watchman and escaped with \$30,000 worth of furs.  
Confirmation of a decision of the

government to appoint a Canadian customs officer in New York was received in a telegram sent from Ottawa by J. H. King, minister of public works, to the board of trade.  
Officials of the Ku Klux Klan of Delaware county, Indiana, announces a break with the national organization and plan a new national order to be known as Nobles of the Klan of the North.  
Italian and Jugo Slav officials have formally set stakes marking the new boundary between Fiume and Susak.  
Katherine Malm, "the wolf woman," has been sentenced to life imprisonment for the slaying in Chicago of Edward Lehmann, during a hold-up.  
Because of the spread of foot and mouth disease among cattle, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace has issued orders quarantining six California counties.  
On March 24 the annual government auction of American furs will be held in New York for the first time, having previously been held in St. Louis.  
Miss Mary Toothill, a public school teacher, died in a hospital at White Plains, N. Y., from a fractured skull, received when a piece of ice sliding from the roof of the Memorial Methodist Episcopal church, struck her on the head.  
Michael Chevenus of Eastport, L. I., suffered no serious injuries when buried six hours under eight feet of earth, when a well, he was digging, caved in on him.  
Anthony Panlano, charged with being the "tipster" of the gang which murdered two Brooklyn bank messengers last November, has been found guilty of first degree murder, the fourth to be convicted of the crime.  
At Hammond, Ind., the body of a well-dressed woman, about 55 years of age, was found in a Big Four box car with two bullet holes through her head.
