Welcott Veteran Dies
Leslie Roscoe, 29, first Welcott boy to enlist in the World War and who received four citations for bravery, died Friday night at his home in East Washington Street.

He enlisted June 2, 1917 in the Second Division of Marines and was discharged March 23, 1919. He fought in three battles, at Soissons, Belleau Woods and Chateau Thierry. He was wounded at the battle of Soissons July 13, 1918, where he received an injury to the leg. He also was gassed, and on Feb. 12, 1924, he was declared permanently disabled.
