OSWEGO STRAND PRESENTS "WINGS IN THE DARK"

For those who like their drama replete with thrills, excitement and new ideas, "Wings in the Dark," which comes to the Strand Theatre, Oswego, Thursday and Friday, February 21 and 22, should be marked on their list as one they cannot afford to miss.

A love story laid against the timely and topical plot of a pilot who dares death in the perfection of "blind flying," it stars beautiful Myrna Loy and Cary Grant as a pair of flying daredevils, and although it is impossible to gauge the excellence of Miss Loy's performance, she seems to excel even the best of her past performances in her breezy, down-to-earth and sympathetic role in "Wings in the Dark."

Cary Grant's characterization is equally gratifying. His very different and difficult role is superbly handled, and he gives a powerful performance which should be remembered for a long time. Deprived of his usual good looking clothes, he is a leather jacket pilot almost throughout and proves that he can hold his own admirably as an actor. The story is a very ably constructed one of an inventor pilot who perfects instruments for blind flying. He is actually blinded before he can hop off on the flight which will prove his instruments.

This turn of affairs involves him and those around him in a series of exciting situations. But he works on his instruments so that, even while blind, he can fly with them. The last half of the picture builds to one of the most thrilling climaxes that has ever reached the screen.

MUST SAVE LAND FOR AGRICULTURE

The United States must conserve her agricultural lands to remain a permanently productive agricultural country, a farm and home week audience at Cornell was informed by H. H. Bennett, director of the soil erosion service, United States Department of the Interior.

The service, he said, is going ahead as rapidly as possible, and for the first time in history, with large-scale jobs to prevent and control erosion, and has shown it can be controlled by land treatment.

The speaker pointed out that the soil erosion service now has 32 active projects under way in 31 states, comprising an area of about 28 million acres. Within 21 of the older areas, more than 10,000 farmers have signed contracts to carry out for five years the control measures recommended by the service. These contracts apply to 1,500,000 acres.

The program of the soil erosion service calls for a survey of every farm on which work is done. Mr. Bennett stated. Soils, slopes, and the condition of erosion are plotted on farm maps which also show the boundary of every field, fence lines, forested areas, and other features. Then the farmer and erosion specialists decide on the particular needs and control measures to be undertaken.

ONE GOOD RECIPE

Steamed Fruit Pudding
1 (8 oz.) package dry mince meat and 1/2 cup water boiled almost dry

1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup nut meats, finely chopped
1/2 cup orange juice
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
1 1/2 cups dry cake crumbs

Break mince meat into pieces. Add cold water. Place over heat and stir until all lumps are thoroughly broken up. Bring to brisk boil; continue boiling for three minutes or until mixture is practically dry. Allow to cool. Add slightly beaten egg, nut meats, orange juice and grated rind to cake crumbs. Blend thoroughly. Fold in cooled mince meat. Pour into greased pudding mold, eight individual molds, or baking powder can, filling two-thirds full. Cover tightly and steam one hour, having boiling water half way up on mold. If additional water is needed during steaming, it must be boiling when added. Serve warm with hard sauce or whipped cream. Serves eight.
