## FALL KILLED LOCAL MAN

Patrick Darby Fell Through Elevator Shaft at Woolen Mill Yesterday Afternoon and Was Instantly Killed.

Dr. E. J. Casack, coroner, conducted an inquest at 1 o'clock this afternoon into the death of Patrick Darby, 62, of 115 W. 1st st., who was killed instantly when he fell three stories down an elevator shaft at the Fulton Woolen Mills late yesterday afternoon.

It is not known how the accident occurred as there was no one near at the time Mr. Darby alighted from the elevator on its upward journey. It is believed that he stepped back into the shaft in the belief that the elevator was there. Workmen on the floors below saw the man falling and gave the alarm. He struck on hard planking at the bottom of the shaft fracturing the skull and bones of the face. It is believed that he struck on his head, and on the left side.

Dr. C. L. Fessenden was summoned and arrived soon after the accident. Finding the man dead, the physician summoned the coroner, who ordered the body removed to the undertaking rooms of Young & Hill.

Mr. Darby was a well-known resident of the West Side where he had lived most of his life. He was a stone-mason and was one of the best known fishermen in this section. He had been working in mill No. 6 of the woolen company for several months.

Besides his widow and one daughter, Anna, he is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Michael Fitzgerald, Miss Catherine Darby and Miss Rose Darby, all of this city, and Miss Agnes Darby of Waterloo.

The funeral will be held from his late home Saturday morning at 8:15 and at 9:00 o'clock from the Church of the Immaculate Conception. The Rev. John E. Lindeman will officiate and burial will be made in St. Mary's cemetery.

## SIDEWALK RIDERS TO BE ARRESTED

Bicyclists riding on the sidewalks of the city hereafter will be arrested, according to Chief of Police Dyer, and a fine of \$10, the usual penalty for this offence imposed.

Accidents are seldom reported of cyclists colliding with pedestrians on sidewalks, yet there are many complaints received of reckless riding by youngsters who do not properly respect the rights of pedestrians.

Automobilists will be under better control this year than ever before, it being the intention of Chief Dyer to enforce all traffic regulations, including the display of lights at night. Arrests will follow violations. It is probable that two members of the force will this year be detailed to enforce the regulations as a considerable amount of automobile traffic is expected on the downtown streets when the touring season is under way.

## FIDO SHOULD WEAR A NEW TAG

If He Doesn't, and Is Caught, and You Would Return Him to the Fold, Costs Will be Added.

The dog tags for 1916 are now on sale at the office of the city clerk. The dog catcher has been appointed, to begin operations at once. Dogs not tagged after this date will be treated with all due courtesy for a reasonable length of time, and then left to the tender mercies of Mr. Catcher. If the owner of a dog, or dawg, wants to redeem his hand from the clutches of the master of ceremonies, he will have to pay more than the license sum to regain the pet. The law provides for a fine of not less than \$3 nor more than \$5 for any person who shall harbor a dog for three consecutive days, without a license, the same being considered the owner.

Persons owning small dogs sometimes evade their obligations regarding the license question, and sometimes there are complaints of discrimination.

It is well, therefore, to bear in mind that Mr. Catcher is making his rounds ready to take all dogs not displaying the tag to his place of incarceration. If your dog is not tagged, do it now. It may be well to have your last year's license with you when calling upon City Clerk Allen for a new tag.
