HARRY COVILLE MURDERED.

MRS. NELLIE DURFEE AND RAY DINGMAN TAKEN TO COUNTY JAIL.

Ray Dingman and Mrs. Nellie Durfee of this city were taken to the county jail at Oswego late yesterday afternoon to await a hearing in connection with the murder of Harry Coville, of No. 568 West First street, who was found dead at one o'clock yesterday morning at West First and Walnut streets with a bullet wound in his breast.

No formal charge has been made, but the man and woman were taken by the police following an examination into the case during the day, in which conflicting stories were told to Chief E. J. Dyer and other officers. The police were notified of the shooting by the family of William Hinsdale of No. 564 West First street, who were awakened by revolver shots coming from the corner of the street.

Find Dingman at Scene.
Chief Dyer and Officer Fox were soon on the scene and found Dingman, who told them, the officers state, he had seen Coville shot by an Italian. Dingman told the officers also that Mrs. Durfee had been another witness of the shooting.

Coroner E. J. Cusack was summoned and ordered the body to the rooms of E. P. Cole & Son, undertakers. Chief Dyer and Officers Fox, Norton, Brannigan, Bray, Gordon and Brown then began a search for Mrs. Durfee. She was found at her home in West Fifth street, where she lives with her husband.

Dingman and Mrs. Durfee were taken to the police station, where yesterday they were examined by Francis D. Calkin district attorney, Sheriff Buck and Undersheriff Schultz.

Mrs. Coville yesterday told the police that a tall, slim, dark-complexioned man called at her at 10:30 o'clock Saturday night and inquired for her husband. He said, "Tell your husband to be sure to be in work at five o'clock tomorrow morning."

Wife Saw Man Fall.
She said her husband came in later and when told of the message went out. She later became nervous at his absence, she said, and went on the street. She said she saw two men and a woman further down the street. She said she heard shots and saw a man fall. She did not know who they were.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. Cusick at the undertaking rooms yesterday afternoon, and the bullet was found to be of 32 caliber, and had penetrated the breast, passed through the heart and right lung, and lodged under the skin behind the right shoulder blade.

Coville was twenty-five years old. He was born in Hannibal, and besides his wife and three small children, Felma, 6; Doris, 3; and Irene, six months old, is survived by his mother, Mrs. Morgan Butler, of South Granby; three sisters and three brothers. He had been in the employ of Dan George Ice Company for the past season, and previously had worked for Charles Cook, on his dairy farm, a mile south of the city, on the West River road.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon from Cole's undertaking rooms. Burial will be made at Fairdale.
