VON KETTLER ARCH.

Dedicated at Pekin Sunday With Impressive Ceremony. Pekin, Jan. 19.—The dedication of the Von Kettler memorial arch, which occurred Sunday, was an impressive ceremony...

The dedication took place in the presence of a brilliant assemblage of diplomats, many Chinese officials, all the military officials in Pekin, the entire foreign community of the city as well as German officers and civilians from Tien Tsin and other cities...

The streets and roofs from which a view of the spectacle was to be had were crowded with Chinese. The German troops were aligned in the street south of the arch, while the Chinese soldiers occupied the corresponding position north of the memorial.

Baron Von Der Goltz, first secretary of the German legation, officiated in behalf of Germany and Prince Chun, brother of the emperor, who was sent to Germany to apologize for the murder of the minister, represented China at the altar, while imperial sacrificial vessels were erected before the arch...

To these words, Baron Von Der Goltz replied: "This monument has been consecrated to the Emperor of Germany by the Emperor of China as permanent proof of the anger of the Chinese emperor. In erecting this monument, China fulfills an obligation she took up after the events of 1900. The monument shall stand as a sermon to posterity and a lasting symbol of the desire of the Chinese government to promote and perpetuate friendly relations with foreign governments."

These two speeches were read in German and in Chinese. After the dedication the German troops marched under the arch, while the bands played national airs.

WORKING OVERTIME.

Collieries and Washeries Worked Saturday Night and Sunday.

Scranton, Pa., Jan. 19.—As an experiment, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company operated its Brislin, Cayuga and Diamond collieries in this city Saturday night until 10:30 and its Storrs colliery until 8 o'clock, making 15 and 12 hours respectively for the day.

The output of the collieries for the day were 8,500 tons or 2,200 more than their normal output.

The result was entirely satisfactory and the mines can be run every night if the men will work. A canvass was made of the men working at the different collieries of the company, but only at the mines mentioned would the men volunteer to work. The company has two washeries that ran all Saturday night and four that worked Sunday. The Saturday and Sunday shipments of the company aggregate 64,000 tons. Up to date the shipments of the company from its collieries exceed by 75,000 tons the shipments for the same period of December.

Reading of Bible in Schools. Albany, Jan. 19.—That extracts from the Bible are read without comment by the reader, in every public school in New York city, while in the rest of the state it is not generally done, leads the present state superintendent of public instruction, C. R. Skinner, to announce boldly that, despite the ruling of his predecessors that it violates the constitution, he will not stop such reading in other portions of the state, providing there is no sectarian teaching accompanying it.

Local authorities are empowered to establish courses of study in the schools under their charge. I think this may be fairly construed to include the opening exercises, subject of course to the right of appeal to this department from an abuse of this power. "Wherever the practice thus established shall violate the provisions of the constitution, and shall include the teaching of any sectarian tenet or doctrine, I should feel impelled, in case of appeal, to prohibit such exercises. But where the Scriptures are read, as the statute provides they shall be, in the city of New York, without note or comment by a public school teacher in a public school of this state, as part of the opening exercises, I shall deem it my duty to rule that such practice is not in violation of the constitution or statutes of this state."

Big Bequest to Buffalo Newsboys. Buffalo, Jan. 19.—By the will of the late Helen T. Campbell, which was Saturday filed for probate in Brooklyn, Harriet T. Sewell of Fort Erie, Ont., a sister of the testator, falls heir to all the latter's interest in the firm of Thornton & Chester, a milling concern of Buffalo. To an Episcopal organization, the testator bequeaths the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of building a memorial to the testator's father and to the newsboys and boot-blacks' home of Buffalo, the same amount of money is allotted.

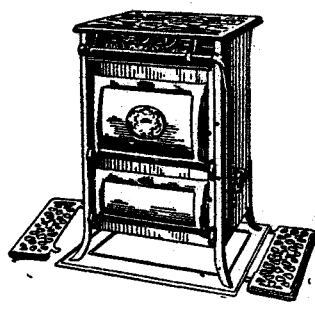
