**DIED.**

Patrick Fox, aged 57, died at his home in North Seventh street on Tuesday after a residence of fifty-four years in this city. The funeral will be held from the Catholic church on Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock. Interment will be made in St. Mary's.

**Methodist Conference.**

The annual Northern New York Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which will be held in the First M. E. Church in Utica, beginning Wednesday, April 18, will be attended by some of the most prominent men in Methodism. The presiding officer will be Bishop Daniel A. G. Hodges, D. D., LL. D., of Boston, Mass. The conference will probably continue for five or six days. Among the speakers will be Jacob A. Riis of New York, who will speak on "The Battle with the Slums." In the cabinet the term of the Rev. O. B. Coit, presiding elder of the St. Lawrence district, will expire. There are two candidates for the position, the Rev. C. C. Townsend of Camden and the Rev. S. T. Dibble of Ogdensburg. The Rev. S. T. Dibble was formerly presiding elder of the Oswego district. The Rev. Mr. Townsend has for several years been conference secretary and was a delegate to the General Conference which met in Los Angeles two years ago. Both Rev. Townsend and Rev. Dibble have many warm friends in Fulton. It is expected that Rev's Robinson and Richards will be returned to Fulton.

**Surrogate's Court.**

The late Father P. J. Kearney, who died March 11, left an estate valued at \$3,000 personal property. He made no will. A petition for letters of administration was filed in Surrogate's Court by Thomas F. Kearney, of Syracuse, a nephew. In addition to the petition the heirs at law are Lillian F.
