HUNTING LICENSES

County of Oswego Contributed a Nice Fat Sum to the State Treasurer

There were 2,562 hunting licenses issued in the County of Oswego during 1910, according to a compilation just made by Miscellaneous Clerk O. L. Aisever, of the County Clerk's office. The opening of the pheasant season probably many to take a shot at the shooting; at any rate there were only 2,156 licenses issued in 1909, making an increase of 396 in 1910 over the year previous.
