Many years ago the State of New York started, in a small way, to acquire land in the Adirondack and Catskill mountain regions, and by means of gradual purchasing has accumulated, on behalf of the State, what to-day is a magnificent property, totaling in round numbers a million and three-quarter acres.

From that report we learn that the engineers of the Water Supply Commission are of the opinion that if every available site in the Adirondack region for the building of storage dams and the impounding of flood waters was utilized, the total area of lands owned by the State and flooded by means of these structures would not exceed 30,000 acres.
