Butter—The butter market fluctuated slightly during the week and closed steady. Creamery sales, highest score, advanced 1/4c per lb. since Friday of last week. Latest prices: Creamery salted, higher score, was 23 1/4 to 24 1/2 per lb; extra 90 score, 23 1/4 per lb; extra, 91 score, 23 1/4c.

Cheddar—Held specials advanced 1/4c per lb. last week. Saturday and the market continued steady since then. Latest prices: New York State held, fancy to special, 21 to 23c per lb; short held, 16 to 18c; fresh specials, 18 to 19c; fresh fancy, 12 to 12 1/2c.

Eggs—The egg market closed irregular. Nearby and Pacific Coast whites and fancy browns, continued steady throughout the week. Mixed colors and gathered browns tended downward during the week. Latest prices, nearby hennery whites, closely selected, extra, 22 to 24c per dozen.

Governor, June 1.—Cheese sold at 11c on the Governor, which is a gain of 1/2c over the previous week. The offerings were 2,556 boxes, as compared with 1,700 boxes a week ago.
