MARCH HOME RELIEF \$6,058.69

Of which \$2,928.58 will be returned by the State TERA at 60 Per Cent—Balance of \$3,130.11 From Previous Month.

According to reports received from the Lewis County Welfare Department, March home relief expenditures were \$4,008.69, of which \$2,928.58 will be reimbursed by the State TERA at 60 per cent. This total shows a decrease of \$346.85 from expenditures for the previous month and are approximately \$2,500 less than for March, 1936. There are also 162 less cases on home relief during March, this year, than a year ago.

During the month, 296 cases were aided, consisting of 1,201 individuals; 52 cases were closed, most of whom received employment. Nearly one-half of the cases responded during the month were reopened because of illness in the family. The remaining were opened for supplementation to their private earnings.

The reimbursable expenditure of \$2,928.58 was as follows: Food, \$2,285.95; shelter, \$201.67; fuel, \$228.82; light, \$9.24; clothing, \$249.45; home, \$22.83; medical, \$238.34. This was disbursed as follows: Croghan, \$122.40; Denmark, \$307.78; Diana, \$709.34; Greig, \$218.90; Harrisburg, \$116.84; Lewis, \$228.90; Lyster, \$144.80; Lowville, \$376.78; Lyonsville, \$275.98; Martinsburg, \$507.77; New Bremen, \$14.00; Oweego, \$85.50; Pincney, \$1,100.00; Turin, \$154.63; Watson, \$238.46; West Turin, \$268.53; Lewis County, \$289.50.
