CENTRAL SCHOOL PLAN ADVOCATED

Would Eliminate the District School Trustee's Position - Young Commission to Urge Forming State in Districts - Each Centralized District Would Have a Board of Education

Albany. - The little red school house will be speeded on the path to extinction in New York state if recommendations of the regents' inquiry on the cost and character of education, soon to be given to the public, are adopted.

The district school houses will linger on and be used a while longer, but the system of school districts is slated for swift oblivion within the next few years, if the report prevails. No longer will farm neighbors gather for contests to see who will be district trustee; the next study and have the power of naming the teacher for the one-room school that power will be lodged with the boards of education of centralized boards of education of centralized school districts.

Despite the fact that more of the inquiry report will be given out soon after the opening of the constitutional convention, reliable forecasts indicate that there will be little if it requiring that conclude's attention.
