All School Grades Will Learn Aviation And Plane Building

ber 1942, every school should be offering junior aviation work to all pupils as a part of the regular industrial arts program. While; this will modify your industrial arts program it should not disrupt it seriously.

"These programs will be under the supervision of Roy G. Fales, Supervisor of Industrial Arts Education."

The School Program

Grades 1-3—Read about aviation; draw pictures of planes; study the geography of airlines, visit airport, make sand table airport, collect aviation pictures.

Grades 4-6—Continue reading, drawing, and study aviation; also some construction of very simple model planes, model airplanes, air maps, scrap books, collect small airplanes and pictures. This can be easily developed through class or club activity.

Grades 7-9—Offer a required course of 50 to 100 hours in the construction of rubber band powered flying and scale model planes; also a study of the elementary principles of aeronautics. This course can also be supplemented with a junior aviation club.

Grades 10-12 — (a) A full year course in making and studying gas powered model planes. (b) A full year course in designing, constructing and flying of model planes. (c) A full year course in construction and flying of gliders. (d) A full year course in elements of aeronautics. This course might be a theory course.

As in other industrial arts courses, Regents credit may be granted for an approved prepared or unprepared local course. State courses may be specially approved for use.

School Will Assist Navy By Making Model Airplanes

used. "Identification must be of second nature for a pilot," he said, "for in a 'dog fight' no pilot has time to look for plane markings."

"These models will be on an exact scale of 1 to 72. That means that a model plane seen at 35 feet is identical with the true airplane seen at just under half a mile. By studying the model through a standard ring sight used on aerial gun mounts, the pilot learns not only identification but range as well."

"The models will serve also to train civilian 'spotters' in identifying enemy planes. The British, I understand, have found invaluable the ability of citizens, through close study of models, to identify a plane in the instant it might take to pass from one cloud bank into another."

"The safety of our major cities may soon depend on the ability of our citizens along coastal areas to spot and report quickly and accurately the types of enemy planes that may approach our shores."

Each youth who produces stated quantities of accepted models will receive an individual certificate including his name and a statement on the importance of the work issued by the U. S. Navy Bureau of Aeronautics.
