PHEASANT DOG 'WORLD SERIES' OCT. 6-17

More nationwide interest than ever before is indicated in the pheasant dog "world series" of four national championships to be contested at the State Three Rivers game management area near Baldwinsville, Oct. 6-17. The concentrating of the four national championships into 11 days of intense competition, is attracting more entries than in the past from far away areas.

This year there are no "days off" between events. This appeals to dog owners who wish to stay for the entire series at a minimum expenditure of time and money. Therefore, many of the 48 continental states and several provinces of Canada will have their best dogs competing here for top U. S. honors.

The series starts Oct. 6-9 with a "bang". The National Pheasant shooting dog championship sponsored by the State Bird Dog Assn. and which usually has the largest number of entries of the four championships. Then follow: "national amateur" for non-professional handlers, Oct. 10 to 12; the national futurity, for pups under two, Oct. 13 and 14; and "the national open" Oct. 15-17.

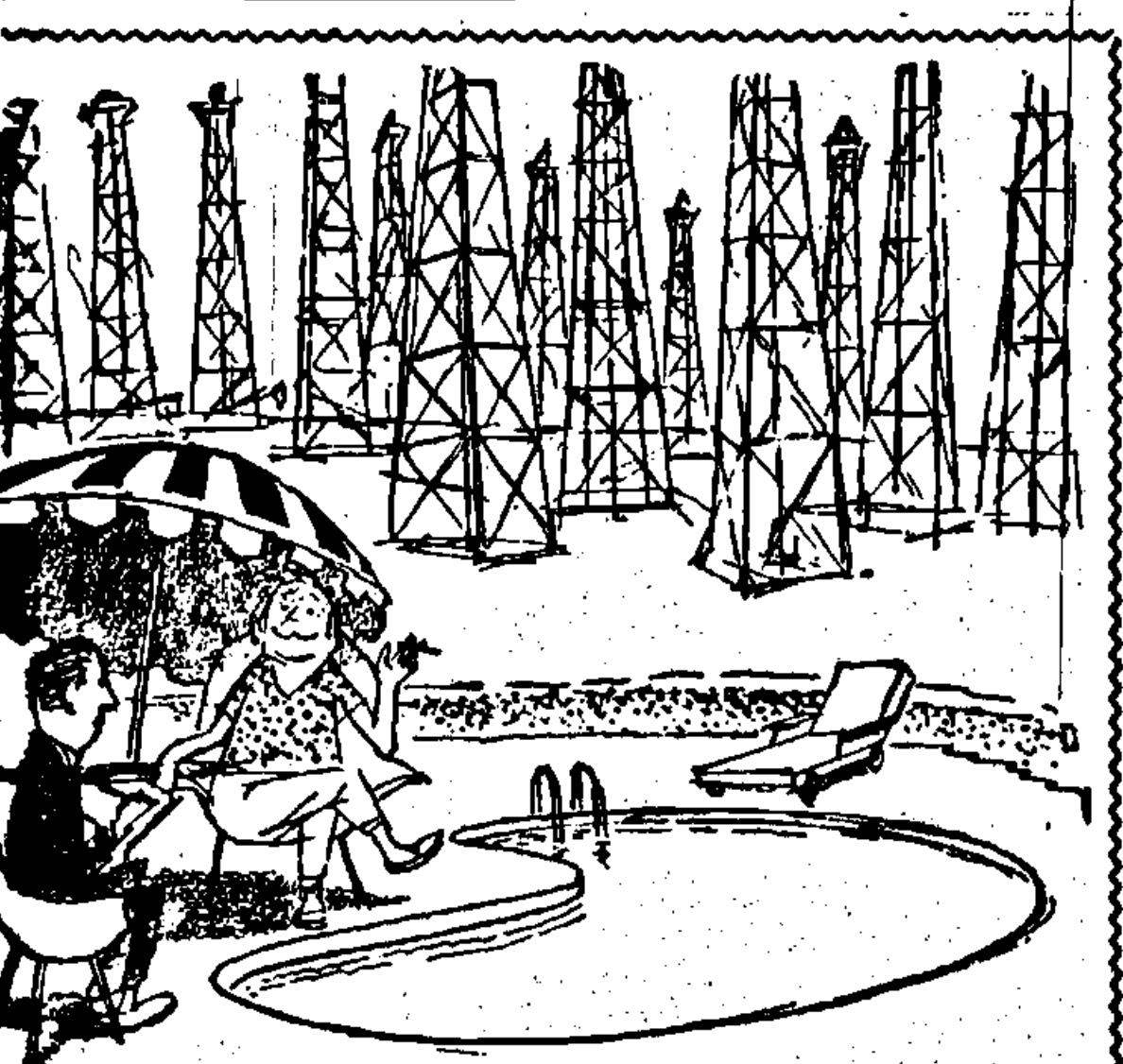
