Exploring is a program of activities, experiences, and ideals which will help young men reach and strive for personal goals in citizenship, service, vocational exploration, social skills, personal fitness, and outdoor living.

ADULTS: Over 2,698 adults serve voluntarily as Cubmasters and Den Mothers, Scoutmasters, Explorer Advisors, Scout unit committeemen, institutional representatives, commissioners, merit badge counselors, and as council and district members.

A staff of three professionally trained men are employed by the Scout Council to provide guidance in carrying out the council program.

COUNCIL PROGRAM
1. Help organize new Scout units and provide methods for institutions to select qualified leaders. A total of 8 new Cub Scout packs, Boy Scout troops, and Explorers units were organized in the council during the last year.

2. Train Scout leaders in unit operation, program skills and use of Scouting literature. A total of 62 Scout unit leaders have completed basic training.

3. Provide camping facilities and other outdoor program resources. A total of 37 Boy Scout troops and 597 Boy Scouts had at least 10 days and nights of Scout camping last year.

4. Give direction to special events and activities to supplement and stimulate unit program. These included last year Scout-O-Rama 67, XII World Jamboree Scout Week and Philmont Expedition.

5. Assist Scout units in the advancement awards and 813 merit badges were presented last year.

6. Offer guidance in health and safety practices. The Boy Scouts of America is meeting the challenge of the President's Council of Fitness and is adding to Scouting's record in this field by making available to every Scout unit a program called "Fit For Tomorrow."

Facts About 1968 Boy Scout Drive

Here are the facts about the Council Sustaining Membership Enrollment which provides funds for the approved operating budget of the Oswego County Council. The Enrollment is planned at the council level, training of enrollment salesmen is held at the district level and enrollment is done at the community level. All funds raised are used for the benefit of the boys of this Oswego County Council area.

DATES: Kickoff meetings in all communities for the general enrollment phase of the campaign will be held May 1-8. Special committees will solicit "leadership gifts" and "special gifts" prior to the general solicitation.

THEME: "ENROLL! HELP EVERY BOY BELONG!"

GOAL: The "fair share" of the operating budget allotted to the Council Enrollment is \$22,790. The remainder of the total operating budget of \$28,160 comes from the United Fund and Community Chest.

ENROLLMENT: Community Sustaining Membership Enrollment will be held AREA: in all areas of the Oswego

County. These are Oswego, Mexico, Parish, Pulaski, Sandy Creek, Lacona, Hannibal, Fulton, Phoenix, Central Square, and North Shore.

SCOUT COUNCIL: The Oswego County Council of the Boy Scouts of America is the administrative and service center for carrying out the local volunteer program for the benefit of the institutions using the Scouting program in their Cub Scout packs, Boy Scout troops, and Explorer units. The local Scout council is chartered by the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, to bring Scouting to all boys who want to become members in Oswego County.

BOY MEMBERS: The Oswego County Council has 1,264 Cub Scouts (8,9, and 10 years of age) in 35 Cub Scout packs, Cub Scouting is a year-round family and home-centered program of boy action, boy achievement, and boy health, built around personal fitness and boy helpfulness.
