

# JOHN SHEEHAN TALKS POLITICS.

John C. Sheehan, once leader of Tammany Hall, and now Richard Croker's political enemy, talked yesterday about the coming Mayoralty campaign. He had recently charged Richard Croker with being responsible for the defeat of Mr. Bryan in New York State and the Nation. In an interview with a New York Times reporter Mr. Sheehan said:

"The people of this city must now face the Mayoralty campaign. It is my firm belief that an organization which will be Democratic in every sense will be formed soon to take an active part in the campaign. The question is whether the present leadership of Tammany Hall will continue to dominate the affairs of the city. I do not know who will form this organization, and I have no direct knowledge of the parties who will control it. The undoubted object of the organization will be to give to the Democrats of the Greater New York a candidate for Mayor whom the people would be glad to see in that office."

"I honestly believe that if Bird S. Coler had been nominated for Governor the result in this State would have been different. I believe that Mr. Coler would not only have carried the State of New York but would have added strength to Mr. Bryan's cause in other States. The fact that he was not a candidate may prove of no greater benefit to the taxpayers of New York as I am confident it will result in making him the next Mayor of the Greater New York. The people believe in the honesty, integrity, and uprightiness of the Controller. I am not looking for any personal gain in this matter, as my business interests are such that I could not now devote my time to a political place."

"What would be the issues of the campaign?" was asked.

"There is no reason why there should not be a great reduction in taxation. I am opposed to any man of Puritanical ideas or narrow-minded in any way being in the Mayor's office. New York is a great cosmopolitan city, and it should be governed as such. The levying of blackmail, police blackmail, or any other method of blackmail, such as has been described in the newspapers for several years, should be stopped."

"The paramount issue in this campaign, however, will be to resume the City of New York from the repeater, thug, and sand-bagger, and make it a safe home for every honest man, rich or poor, notwithstanding his political views. We should have a 'wide-open town', but it should be a 'wide-open town' in the sense that all laws are recognized, and the rights of respectable people are not trampled on."

"What does the small plurality obtained by Mr. Bryan in New York County indicate?"

"It proves conclusively that Tammany Hall is in a minority, and can be defeated at the polls if the people take it into their heads to do so. Manhattan and the Bronx ought to be Democratic by 80,000. It will be remembered that Cleve and received about 75,000 majority in 1892. Considering the conditions which existed in New York City in 1896 and in 1900, Mr. Bryan should have received a much larger majority in New York County this year."

"To what do you attribute the falling off?"

"I would have to discuss a personal matter to explain," said Mr. Sheehan with a smile.

### Generous Emperor.

One of the invariable habits of the German Emperor is to send the game that he shoots as presents to the various Ambassadors accredited to his court, or to Ministers and great dignitaries of his household.

A while ago he gave directions that a particularly fine bear, which he had laid low with his rifle, should be sent to the Turkish Ambassador, entirely forgetting that the latter's religion prohibited his eating the flesh of swine, although the animal was shot while in the wild state.

His Excellency accepted the gift, for he considered of course that it would be discourteous to refuse an imperial gift, or to draw the attention of the monarch to the mistake that he had made.

He thought, however, that there was no reason why he should not turn an honest penny by it, for Turkish diplomats are generally in a chronic state of financial difficulties. Accordingly he sold it to a game dealer, who hung it up in his shop window and embellished it by a large placard, gay with ribbons, upon which was written that this superb animal had been shot by His Majesty the Emperor.

Inquiries made by court officials brought to light the little financial transaction which had taken place between the Turkish Ambassador and the game dealer.

### Making Fires of Treacle.

One has heard of the festive slaves using beat lump sugar to light a refractory fire. But the idea that it is possible to use molasses as a paying fuel will probably come as a shock to some people. Still, this is being done regularly nowadays on some of our American plantations. The coarse black grades of molasses have fallen so much in price that the Louisiana sugar planters found it would not pay carriage. So they started dumping tons of it into the bayous until this was stopped by the authorities. Their some inventive genius took to using it as fuel, and it is found it pays well so to do. It is sprinkled over the "bagasse," or crushed cane-stalks, from which the juice has been extracted. This when fed into the furnaces burns with a fierce heat. Over 100,000 tons were so used last year.

## PINK AND BLUE POPULAR.

Paris, France: Madame Loubet appeared at the President's reception, the other day, in a gown of Roman blue satin cloth. The skirt was plain in front with dozens of tiny side plaits disposed along each side. At the back there was an inverted box plait. This gave the popular flare. The skirt was cut what is called round length. It lay upon the floor all the way around and in front would have been unmanageable had it not flared so widely. The belt was cut with the deep dip in front making the waist line very low. The "Marie Antoinette dip" this is called.

A wonderful passementerie in pink and blue stones upon a silver gauze was used to trim the skirt. Beginning at the belt line the rows extended straight downward to the knees where they stopped abruptly. Around the foot there was another band of the silver applique, with its burden of beautiful stones.

The waist was cut in two pieces. A little bolero, or house coat, of the Roman blue satin cloth was fastened at the bust line. Underneath was a blouse in mushroom pink taffeta. The lapsels of the little bolero were appliqued in the silver embroidery all covered with the pink and blue stones; and the cuffs which turned back from the elbow were covered with the applique. ## THE GREAT DEAL OF A GREAT MAN.

How M. C. D. Borden, the "Calico King," Bought 15,000 Yards of Cotton and Saved a City.

Matthew C. D. Borden, the head of the largest cotton manufacturing business in the world, has again proved himself the friend of labor. By purchasing 500,000 pieces of cotton goods at 2 7-8 cents he has foiled a conspiracy to reduce wages, averted a strike and saved an entire community from undeserved disaster.

This is not the first time that "the Calico King" has appeared as the champion of the toilers against his fellow-manufacturers. In 1891 he cleared out a glutted market and saved 50,000 mill hands from idleness and famine by buying 850,000 pieces of cotton goods.

In February, 1897, he repeated the operation. This time he took the entire stock held by the Fall River mills—750,000 pieces—and paid \$1,000,000 for it. The effect on the market was an active demand at advanced prices. What appeared most to Mr. Borden was the effect on labor—3,500,000 spindles working full time instead of half time.

In November, 1899, Mr. Borden again started New England by compelling his fellow-manufacturers to advance wages 10 per cent. He had tried his usual remedy of buying a large block of goods, but his rivals had balked him by delaying the completion of the deal. Determined that the army of wage-earners should suffer no longer, and that all talk of a strike should cease, he voluntarily granted the advance of 10 per cent. to the 4,000 hands employed in his own enterprises—the Fall River Iron Works and Cotton Mills, and the American Print Company's works.

Only a month passed before the other manufacturers of cotton goods, much to their disgust, were compelled to follow suit. Fall River alone gained \$25,000 a week in wages by Mr. Borden's action, and throughout New England not less than 100,000 operatives were made prosperous and happy.

### AVERTED A STRIKE.

And now, in 1900, "the Calico King" has won another victory for labor. Again the cotton goods market was in a perilous condition. Again the mill-owners were threatening to cut wages, and the hands were preparing to strike. New England seemed on the eve of an industrial cataclysm.

Mr. Borden's purchase of 500,000 pieces of cotton goods at a total price of \$750,000 relieves the mills of over-produced goods and stimulates the moribund market into activity. When questioned by a reporter of this newspaper in reference to his recent big purchase, Mr. Borden replied: "I want to keep my people employed. My whole record is evidence of that, and it is gratifying indeed if the transaction will have that result. But it's a business venture. I may not make a dollar, and I may have to accept a loss."

"Of course 20,000 pieces per week are not sufficient to prevent overproduction permanently. I must market these goods sooner or later. Fall River produces about 300,000 pieces of cotton goods of all kinds weekly, so you see I am only taking two weeks' output. In distributing it over twenty-five weeks, however, I have—going to take up most of the overplus."

"Our mills are hoped to present, and I hope we shall be able to continue." With which modest words the "Calico King" dismissed the subject of his immense boon to labor.
