Robert Lovely who is pitching gilt edge baseball for the Kempville, Ont., nine, is home for the holiday.

A new fifty-ton mill and dam will be built at Talville. It will be the most complete mill for grinding talc ever built.

The Ford street clerks have become afflicted with the baseball germ and have organized a team which will be heard from Thursday afternoons.

Henry H. Loomis, millionaire, and one of Geneva's oldest residents, was attacked by robbers in his home and tied to a bedpost. They secured but \$10 in money.

Principal Peterson of McGill University, who is in London, cabled the university authorities in Montreal that Lord Strathcona, Canadian high commissioner in London, had given to McGill \$500,000.

The jury in the case of Joseph Sarrento, tried for the murder of Ebert G. Storie at Gouverneur some time ago, brought in a verdict of manslaughter and he was given an indeterminate sentence to prison for not less than one year or more than four.

The arrangement for the closing of the stores of the city Thursday afternoons during July and August, have been practically completed and next Thursday afternoon will be a half holiday for the clerks and business men.

In connection with the Knights of Columbus exercises at Potsdam last week, the Potsdam Herald says an eloquent address was delivered by Father J. P. Dunne of Ogdensburg. Evidently the Potsdam writer had Mr. Dunne's family of ten children in mind.

The crowd at the railroad station in Watertown was entertained by a woman passenger, who, waving an American flag, advocated the election again of Roosevelt. She was at first taken for Carrie Nation, but said her name was Mrs. Woodcock and that she is on her way to Oregon.

In an editorial the Albany Argus says that Dolphus S. Lynde, then a State senator once said that a man was a blankety blank idiot, who would be a Democrat in St. Lawrence county, or a Republican in New York, adding that Mr. Lynde was a sometime Democrat; but he resided in St. Lawrence county. But these were in the days before Ogdensburg gained the distinction of being the only city in the State to give Bryan a majority.

Friday morning the three-year-old son of Joseph Muscato of that city, in attempting to fire the fuse of a cracker, held the blazing match too close to his waist and it took fire. The flames quickly caught the remainder of his clothing and the boy ran screaming toward the house while his companions ran away frightened. The parents rushed out and rolling the boy in the grass, smothered the flames. The lad cannot recover.

several shots were fired in rapid succession.

Men hastening to the scene found her lying upon the street. She was taken to a hospital, where she died.

For a long time the woman had been a habitue of low dives in the Italian quarters of the city. Before her death she said that she had a husband and three or four children. She did not know where her husband was, but the children were in an orphan asylum.
