The residents of Evans Mills, Jefferson county, have been successful in getting the New York Central, with the consent of the Public Service Commission, to change the name of its station from "Evans" to "Evans Mills."

The Rev. F. Lewis Brooks, the clergyman who refused a fee of \$10,000 to marry Madeline Force to the late Colonel John Jacob Astor when he had a charge in Massachusetts, has accepted a call to the Baptist church at Clayton.

Friends of Judge Emerson, of Watertown, have started a boom of his appointment to the Court of Appeals to succeed Justice N. L. Miller, of Cortland, who is soon to resign to become general counsel to the Solway Process company.

Cut-throat competition and unnecessary price cutting were denounced in Chicago Monday by a committee representing the National Association of Lumber Manufacturers testifying before the Federal Trades Commission. The lumber men suggested remedial measures.

The Ogdensburg Gas Company has agreed to lay mains in Lafayette street in the spring of 1916, and the residents of that street have agreed that this will satisfy the complaint which they made to the Public Service Commission. The commission has, accordingly, closed the complaint with the right of the complainants to renew it, should the company not carry out the terms of its stipulation.

Most of the leading typewriter and adding machine companies in the East and Middle West, including those in Syracuse, have formed a new corporation, under the title of the American Ammunition Company to take up contracts for the manufacture of fuses for high explosive and shrapnel shells for the English, French and Russian Governments. The shell commission of the militia department of the Canadian Government, acting for the British War office, is said to have awarded to the American Ammunition Company within a week a contract for the manufacture of fuses amounting to \$10,000,000.

FLYING SQUADRON SPEAKER TO BE HERE ON SUNDAY.

Hon. Oliver W. Stewart of Chicago, formerly of the Illinois Legislature, who is to give an address on Sunday, July 25th, at 2 p. m., in the First Methodist Episcopal church, was one of the speakers in the great Flying Squadron campaign which lasted from September 30, 1914, until the 15th of the following June. As a member of that organization, he visited every state in the Union and his voice has been heard in every capital of every state, as well as the capital of the nation. In the 235 days meetings were held in 255 cities.

Mr. Stewart comes this way at this time under the auspices of the Flying Squadron Foundation, of which Hon. J. Frank Hanly, former Governor of Indiana, is at the head. Mr. Stewart will not only review the great campaign in which he had a part, but will outline to the people the plans for the future, besides giving an up-to-date discussion of the latest phases of the saloon problem. No admission is charged to the lecture and everyone is invited to attend.
