**Another Letter from Gen. Butler.**  
Correspondence with a Secessionist School-mistress—The General defines the Oath of Allegiance.  
We find the following interesting correspondence in the Norfolk New Reign:  
LUCYVILLE, Accomac County, Virginia, March 16, 1864.  
"GEN. B. F. BUTLER—SIR: My school has been closed since Christmas, because, as I understood the oath required of us, I could not conscientiously take it. Having heard since then that one of your officers explains the oath as meaning, simply that we consent to the acts of the United Government, and pledge passive obedience to the same, I take the liberty of addressing this to you to ascertain if you so construe the truth. I cannot understand how a woman can 'support, protect, and defend the Union,' except by speaking or writing in favor of the present war, which I could never do, because my sympathies are with the South.  
"If by these words you understand merely passive submission, I am ready to take the oath and abide by it sacredly.  
"Very respectfully,  
"MARY R. GRAVES."  
GEN. BUTLER'S REPLY.  
"MRS. MARY R. GRAVES, I have your letter of the 14th inst. and am glad to hear that you are a true patriot and a true Unionist. I am truly sorry that any Union officer of mine has attempted to fritter away the effect of the allegiance to the Government; of the United States, and to inform you that it means nothing more than a passive obedience to the same. That officer is surely mistaken. The oath of allegiance means fealty, pledge of faith to love, affection and reverence for the government—all comprised in the word 'patriotism,' in its highest and truest sense, which every true American feels for his or her Government.  
"You say, 'I cannot understand how a woman can support, protect and defend the Union,' except by speaking or writing in favor of the present war, which I could never do, because my sympathies are with the South."  
"That phrase, Madam, shows why you cannot understand how a woman can support, protect and defend the Union. 'Where your loyalties are divided, you cannot follow either. The southern women who are rebels understand well how to support, protect and defend the Confederacy' without speaking or writing 'Some of them act as spies, some smuggle information through the lines in their dresses, some send sick soldiers for the Confederacy, and some get up subscriptions for rebel gunboats.  
"Perhaps it may all be comprised in the phrase, 'Where there is a will there is a way.'  
"Now, then, you could support, protect and defend the Union by teaching the scholars of your school to love and reverence the government, to be proud of their country, to glory in its flag, and to be true to its constitution. But as you don't understand that yourself, you can't teach it to them; and therefore, I am glad to learn from your letters, that your school has been closed since Christmas; and with my consent, until you change your sentiments, and are a loyal woman in heart, it shall never be opened. I would advise you, madam, forthwith, to go where your sympathies are. I am only doubtful whether it is not my duty to send you. I have the honor to be,

Scientific.  
—A late ichthyological writer states that a fish positively does exist that climbs trees. It is the *Anabas-Scandens*, and is called by the natives of India, where it is found, *panai yeri*, that is, "the fish that climbs palm-tree-trees." Where there are palm-trees growing by the side of a pool, when a heavy rain falls, and the water runs profusely down their trunks, this fish, by means of its opercula, or gill-covers, which move unlike those of other fish, crawls up the tree sideways to a height of from five to seven feet, and then drops down. Should this fish be thrown upon the ground, it runs or proceeds rapidly along in the same manner (sideways). Mr. Jesse Mitchell, an Indian naturalist, in the last number of the *Annals of Natural History*, quotes for these facts from long personal observation.  
—The great geologists of Europe, overwhelmed by the testimony presented upon them, are slowly avowing their belief that the antiquity of man has heretofore been greatly underestimated. John Lubbock, in a recent lecture, after commenting upon the conversion of Lyell, Falconer, and other eminent investigators, stated that the existence of man in the "drift age" is now proved beyond all doubt. Referring to the age occupied by the stone, bronze and other periods, and also to the time which must have elapsed during the transmission of languages from the Sanskrit to the tongues of our own time, he expressed his own opinion as coinciding with that of Sir Charles Lyell, that the "drift age" was as far back as that of the bed of the Mississippi—100,000 years.  
—An Irishman who was at the celebrated battle of Bull Run was somewhat startled when the head of his comrade on the left was taken off by a cannon ball. In a few minutes, however, a spent ball broke off the finger of his comrade on the other side. The latter threw down his gun and howled with pain, when the Irishman rushed upon him, exclaiming, "You are a wild woman, stop crying! You are making more noise than the man who just lost his head."
