Oswego's Rick Pratt along with Plattsburgh defenseman Doug Kimura were two first team all-americans.

Pratt, only a junior out of Welland, Ontario, finished the 30 game season with 38 goals and an equal number of assists for 76 points and

ranks among the best ever to don an Oswego State uniform. Pratt had 15 power play goals this season, one shorthanded tally and six winning goals in the year which saw the Lakers finish with the best Division II record on the United States.

Pratt was honored earlier by the ECAC West

coaches as he was selected to the second team of the ECAC Division II West all stars.

Kimura, named as an all american during the early days of his career, was honored once again, but did not compete with the team when it rallied for the ECAC West win in Oswego.
