Stamping Around The World



Christmas issues

This year's Christmas stamps will return to the standard commemorative size and be issued, Oct. 31, in two different locations, the U.S. Postal Service has announced. Both will be 15-cent stamps.

The usual art masterpiece stamp will depict a detail from a stained glass window in the Washington Cathedral and will be issued in Washington, D.C., while the contemporary design stamp will show antique toys on a window sill and will be released in Christmas, Mich.

The stamp being issued in the nation's capital will feature the vignette of a Madonna and Child taken from the Epiphany Window in the Bethlehem Chapel of the Washington Cathedral. The first-day ceremony will be held there at 11 a.m.

Christmas was selected as the issue site for the other stamp because of its topical application for cancellation purposes. The first-day ceremonies will take place at the Munsing, Mich., High School at 10 a.m.

Two different legends appear on the stamps. The Madonna stamp bears "Christmas USA 15c" below the reproduction, with "Season's Greetings" with "USA 15c" slightly above and to the right appears below the window sill on the other stamp.

The art masterpiece detail is taken from one of the five apsidal windows of the Bethlehem Chapel which represent the principal scenes attendant to the incarnation of the Son of God

to which the chapel is dedicated. All five windows are the work of Walter Tower London. The stamp was designed by Esther Fort based on a photograph taken by Patrick S. McCabe.

The contemporary star was designed by Bob Terlake and based on a drawing from his personal collection. A top, a horn and a drum displayed on a window with sunlight illuminating them from the left are hanging on the window frame, at upper left, is Christmas wreath. The window is in the designer's studio, part of a 200-year-old log house - the oldest structure in Davidson County, N.C.

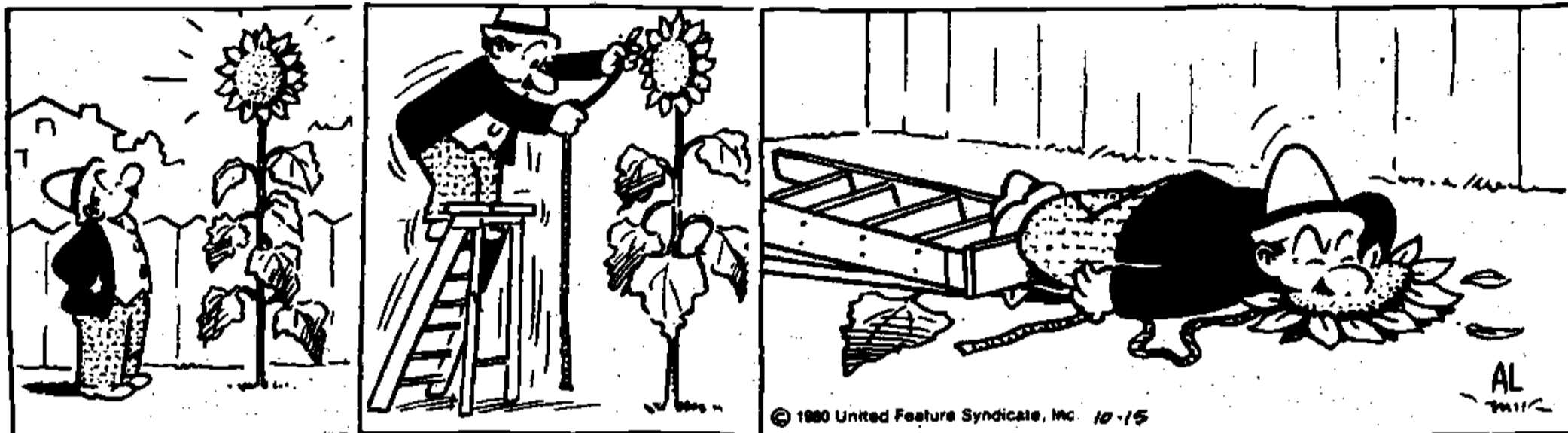
Collectors desiring first day cancellations have usual options. Stamps may be purchased at local post offices, affixed to address envelopes and sent to "First Day Cancellations, Postmaster, Washington, D.C. 200" (or "Christmas, Mich. 498 for the contemporary stamp). No remittance required.

Or, if it is desired that Postal Service affix stamps, send addressed envelope, plus 15 cents check form only, personal OK) for each stamp to be fixed to: "Art Masterpiece Stamp, Postmaster, Washington, D.C. 20013" (or "Season's Greeting Stamp, Postmaster, Christmas, Mich. 49862").

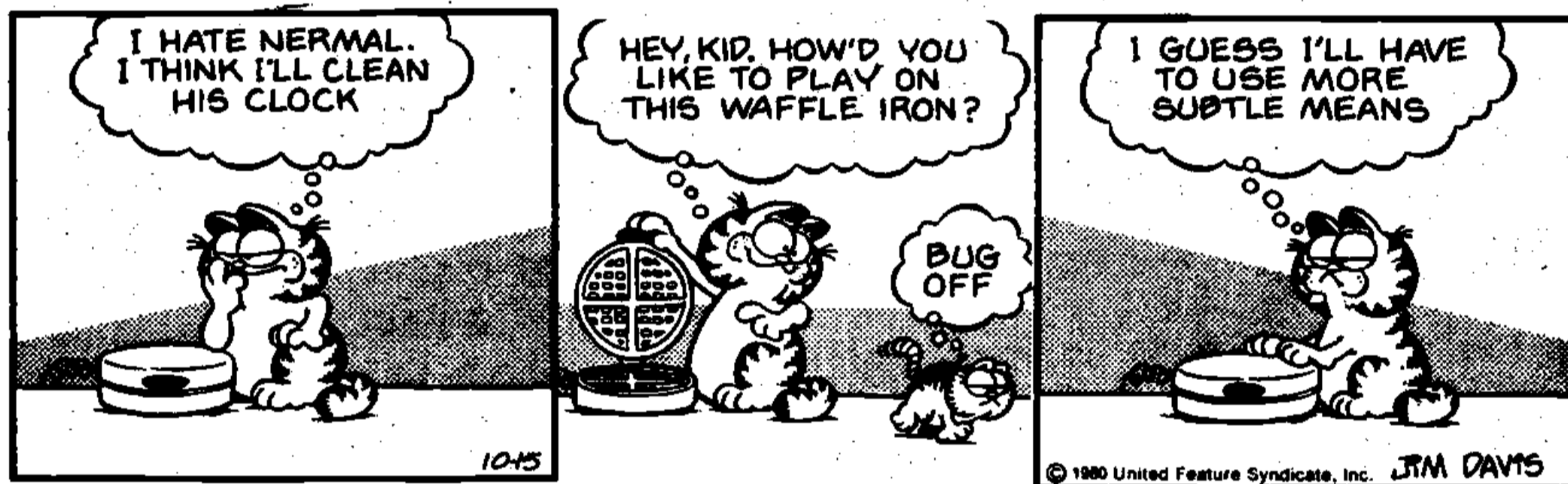
Orders must be postmarked no later than Nov. 15.

Although a design for special 15-cent educational stamp was unveiled in April, no date for issuance was announced at that time.

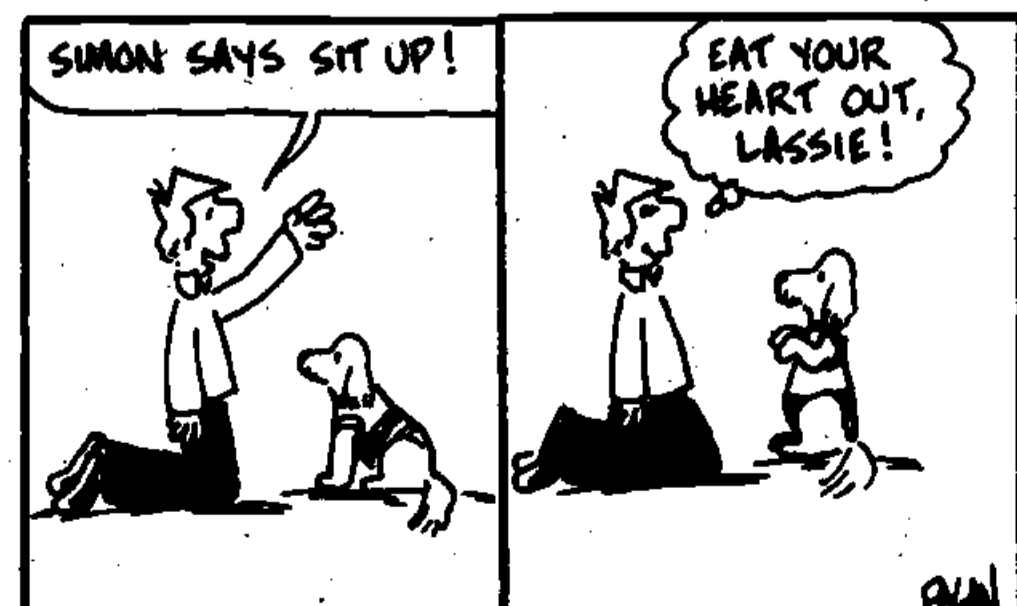
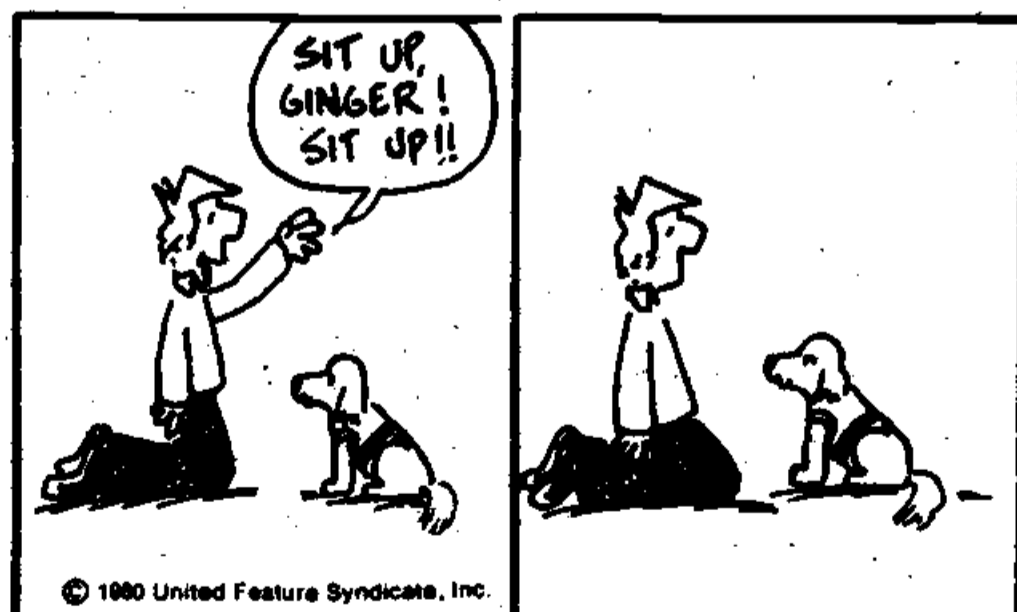
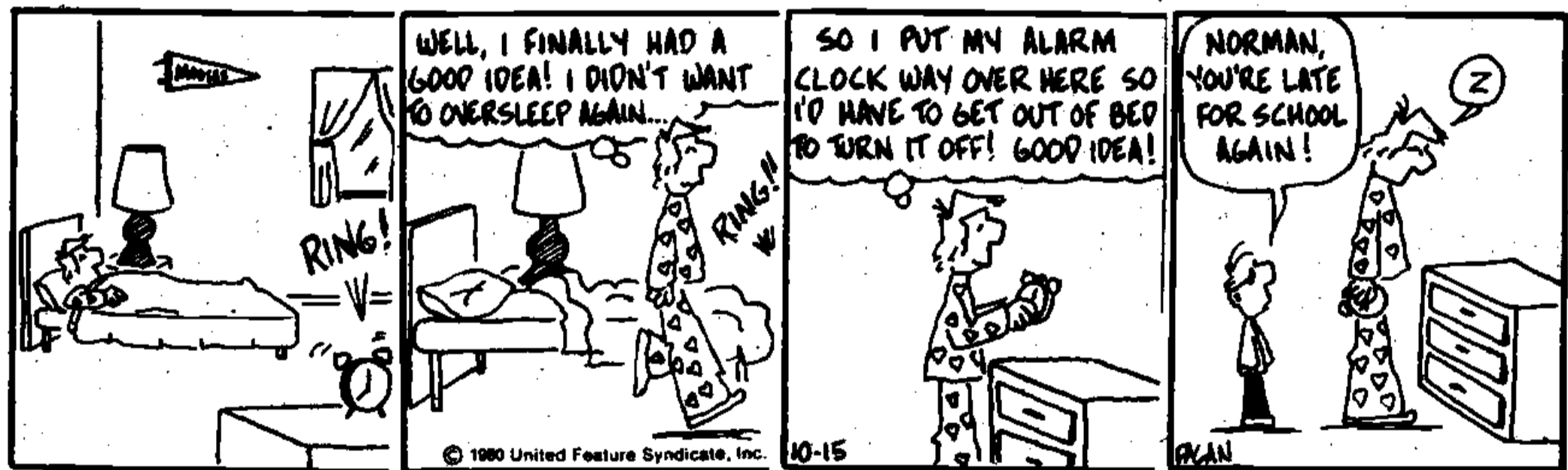
