Oswego Woman Granted Degree

The Biographical Center of Cambridge, England, has awarded the degree of Doctor of Humanities to Wilma Williamson Baitzell of Oswego.

This degree is granted through the World University Cultural Center and is bestowed in recognition of her academic and professional attainments which have contributed to her acceptance in the World Cultural Community. It gives recognition to those capable of performing professional service with humanitarian skill. Not only must a doctoral member of this world body

serve humanity on as broad a scale as possible, with the dedication of a true world server, but he or she must also demonstrate compassion.

Several years ago Dr. Baitzell did a comprehensive study of Creativity and Intelligence which has been used throughout the world. Her theory of the relationship of Christianity, Democracy and Creativity is also well recognized.

Baitzell is a retired art supervisor from SUNY Oswego. She is listed in many notable directories, among them: Directory of International Biography, World's Who's Who of Women, Who's Who of American Women, Directory of Distinguished Americans, Personalities of America, Who's Who of American Art, Anglo-American Who's Who, and International Book of Honor.

A graduate of SUNY Oswego, Baitzell has done post graduate work at Syracuse University; Western State College, Gunnison, Colorado; McGill University, Montreal, Canada; Cooper Union, New York City; Indiana State University; Illinois State University; Wyoming State University; Iowa State Teacher's College; and Columbia University.

Used Refrigerators

If you are thinking of buying a used refrigerator, consider a manual defrost model. It is the most repair-free and least expensive to operate.

If a refrigerator has a strong odor, it may not be a wise purchase, because odors can be difficult and sometimes impossible to remove.

In the refrigerator part, the interior temperature should be somewhat below 40° F. In the freezer, it should register 0° F or lower. These

temperatures are difficult to check, however, because heat enters the refrigerator and the thermometer reading changes each time the door is opened.

Be sure the door is not warped and the gasket is in good condition. If the door does not fit tightly, warm air may leak in, which will increase the operating cost.

The condenser coils should be free of dust and dirt, and the motor should run quietly and smoothly.
