money for summer recreations department help. CETA is no longer available. He said he needed four to five people.

"Without them, we run over budget," he said. Four men at \$3.35/hour for 18 weeks would add \$7,000 to the budget it was explained.

The budget for parks was tentatively increased to \$81,155 from \$76,967. The budget for North Bay was tentatively reduced to \$15,055 from \$15,455 with Spaziani stating that there has been no purposeful damage to the campgrounds this year.

The beach and pool budget was reduced from \$45,366 to \$44,066. There was discussion about \$1,300 listed for the chemical diquat and its application by airplane to destroy weed undergrowth on Lake Neatahwanta. Some of the spray had reportedly damaged foliage on the shore during air application in the spring.

"We are only going to do it by boat this year," Drohan said. "The firemen have a boat. There is a company that does it," he said.

The War Memorial budget was reduced tentatively from \$23,075 to \$22,250, the roller skating rink budget left at \$2,300, the ice skating budget reduced to \$80,085 from \$83,085.

The police department budget listed 1983 salaries of \$836,264, subject to current contract negotiations. Police Chief Walter Hanlon said that the Oneida Street Bridge construction with increased dependence on the Broadway Bridge for access to the west side has increased department costs by \$12,000. He also asked for two new police cars at \$10,000 each, among other department requests for a total of \$24,030.

Hanlon told the aldermen that there are 750 new arrests each year, requiring an arrest card for each and the need for additional files. He also wanted four-channel capability for the police car radios, so that they would have inter-county frequency.

The police budget of \$928,539 subject to salary negotiations was tentatively left unchanged.

The traffic department budget was tentatively reduced to \$76,235 from \$79,935. In his discussion over the item by item budget figures, the chief explained that a request for three warning signs on each side of West First Street at a cost of \$800 in the area of the CYO was made because of a recent accident in which a child ran in front of a car.

Fire Chief Dean Stuber said the \$886,120 for salaries was the 1984 negotiated figure. Stuber asked for a

hydraulic forcible entry and rescue tool to cost \$5,400 and 650 feet of four-inch hose at \$3,850, which he said would correct the water shortage in the hydrants.

Drohan noted that when the water line is constructed across the Oneida Street Bridge, it should increase water pressure in the First Ward. It will also allow the filling of the Batavia Avenue water tank, which is never filled now because the water pressure in the northwest section of the city is low.

Stuber asked for a \$6,000 filter air compressor to replace one which has been in service since 1964 and is wearing, among other budget explanations. The tentative budget for the department is \$948,450.

A public hearing on the tentative complete budget will be held before the Dec. 15 charter-set date for adoption.
