Our City Fathers.

The regular meeting of the Common Council was held last night in the council chamber at the City Hall. The meeting was called to order at 8 P. M. Minutes of the last regular communication read and approved. Several claims of parties against the city presented by the committee on claims were read and approved.

A resolution was also presented by said committee, providing for the purchase of certain maps and manuscripts of surveys, &c., belonging to the late Col. Judson, by the city; which was adopted. The committee on claims also reported a resolution to the effect that inquiry be made in regard to the condition of sidewalks, in reference to the danger from accidents, sprained ankles, &c. A resolution was formed to investigate this matter, and order the building of new sidewalks where required. The committee on streets ordered sidewalks built in the 3d, 5th and 8th wards. In the 3d ward on West Cayuga, west side of 2d street, between Bridge and Cayuga streets; in the 5th ward, west side of 1st street between Albany and Erie streets; and in the 8th ward, Syracuse Avenue, corner of Albany street. Adopted. A motion was also made for the construction of a reservoir on the Orphan Asylum hill. The committee found that the hydrant near by could not be depended on for water, and recommended that a fund, made up from the Hydrant fund and the Fire Commissioners fund, be appropriated to building a reservoir in connection with the Water Works Company, to cost from \$175 to \$200; not to exceed the latter amount.

The general city assessment roll of 1878 in connection with the lamp assessment, and also certain sewer assessments, were confirmed and ordered to be placed in the hands of the City Treasurer, payments to be received for 30 days without fees.

Reports of Officers of Corporation—The Board of Charity reported the expenditure for the month ending August 4th, 1878, \$935.63.

Miscellaneous—A petition of S. H. Lathrop, L. Wright and others, asking that the Central Union Telegraph Co's poles on First street be permitted to remain, was referred to the committee on streets.

The old culvert matter, in relation to the culvert on 5th street, was brought up by Ald. Buckhout, who offered the following:

Resolved, That the City Clerk is hereby instructed to notify the City Attorney not to defend the suit pending against the city by said Buckhout in said matter.

The resolution after considerable debate and strictures by Ald. Hamilton, in regard to certain intimations thrown out by his fellow alderman, was lost. The Council then adjourned.
