JOHN JERMYN PASSES AWAY

Millionaire Coal Operator Died at Scranton Today.

Deceased Wife and Family With Him in Last Hours—He Had Rush For His Home Town—Had Three Children Living in Oswego.

Scranton, Pa., May 29.—John Jermy, the millionaire coal operator, died this morning. The end came at 6:35 o'clock. His death was peaceful and calm.

Mr. Jermy was seventy-two years old. His life was another example of what industry, thrift, business acumen and shrewdness can do.

Mr. Jermy is the owner of Hot Jermy, which will stand as a monument to his industry, the Coal Exchange and the Westminster Hotel property, as well as many other valuable pieces of real estate.

Besides being interested in coal operations, Mr. Jermy was a heavy stockholder in several local banks and financial institutions.

Mr. Jermy is survived by several children, three living in this city.

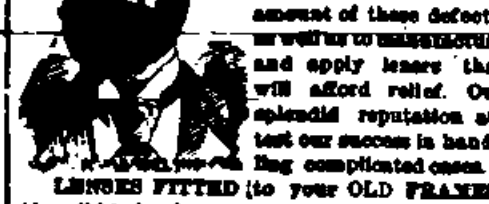

WHEN THE CIRCUS COMES TO TOWN

Big Crowds Out This Morning to Greet Wallace.

Parade Was a Good One and Took in Both Sides of the River—Large Crowd at Afternoon Performance—Performance Tonight Should Attract Many.

Before daylight this morning, the great Wallace circus arrived here from Watertown and hundreds of persons were in Market street to witness the unloading of the horses, etc., despite the cold, damp conditions of the day.

The train contained about fifty mammoth cars, nearly all of which are sixty feet long. Drawn by two powerful locomotives, they rolled into the yards between four and five o'clock.

Three years ago, June 11th, the Wallace circus was last seen here and gave an exhibition on the grounds where it is located today. Since that occasion, until today, there has not been a large circus in the city.

President Dain, of the Department of Works, said it was too hazardous that the passage should not be attempted.

Superintendent O'Brien said it was for the bridge attendants to say whether the wagons were too heavy to cross. And so the matter rested until the circus authorities called and explained that none of the wagons were six tons in weight and that the parade would reach the West side.

The payment was a fine one, the horses, probably, attracting most attention.

But the chief feature was the ponies. There were Filipinos, Japanese and Chinese in the parade, but the former attracted most attention.

There was a large audience at the afternoon performance. The mud and water that has found lodgment upon the ground because of the recent rains was soaked up by loads of sawdust and shavings and there was no inconvenience.

As the rays of the sun began to appear the men at work took on a more cheerful air.

"It's the first pleasant day that we've had in a week," declared one. First to be removed from the train was the big water-proof tent.
