

### SERVICES FOR NON-CATHOLICS.

The Gospel Door of Mercy Open.

Father Farr's Exposition of the Sacraments of Penance and Confession—Answers Questions as to Infallibility of the Pope, the Apocrypha and Transubstantiation.

A large audience listened to Father Farr at St. Louis's church last night, when he gave his third lecture to non-Catholics. The subject was: "The Gospel Door of Mercy." "This door," said the preacher, "is none other than the sacrament of penance. We have an antecedent probability that amongst the sacraments of the Christian law there should be one especially destined for the redemption of sin. The very object of our Lord's coming upon earth was to save sinners. His miracles symbolized and prefigured the saving of spiritual distresses. His parables of the Prodigal Son, Good Shepherd, Good Samaritan showed a solicitude in regard to sinners. Mary Magdalen, Zacharias, the Samaritan woman were amongst the trophies of the sacred heart of the Saviour. Leaving the province of probability, we approach facts. Our Lord promised to confer the power of forgiveness of sins upon His Apostles—'Amen, I say to you whatever you shall bind on earth shall be bound in heaven and whatever you shall loose shall be loosed also in heaven.' Math. xviii, 18. This promise was kept and the power was granted after His resurrection when He said to His Apostles: 'As the Father hath sent me, I also send you. Receive ye the Holy Ghost. Whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them,' John xiii, 31.

"Confession, a part of the sacrament," the lecturer continued, "the natural sinners of our world, the wholesome corrective of pride, the sacred means of amendment of life, an integral part of the sacrament, claims our equivalent attention. Confession is one of those common things which we call a fact. It is existing as a reality, it is in hourly practice and forms a greater sphere of labor than all other pastoral duties. It has three nine tenths of a law which possession claims, and being a fact how can we account for its origin? Is it of human origin when we find so many prejudices arrayed against it, and in our depraved nature so many reasons that would make it shrink from the humiliation which it attends? The Catholic Church fearlessly answers that it is of divine origin, that it has come into existence and into its working reality through the wisdom, goodness and mercy of God."

Among the questions last night many were purely of an historical character and referred to those Popes whose lives are consistently quoted as an objection to the Catholic doctrine of infallibility of the Pope. The reverend orator drew the attention of the audience to the difference between infallibility and impeccability. The Pope's private life might not be irreproachable, yet as teacher of mankind he is infallible in his doctrine on faith and morals. Yet the occasions against many Popes are positive instances, charges which have never been proved, and, if traced to their source, will be found to originate from the pen of an untrustworthy historian. Some historians are apt disciples of Voltaire, whose principle was "Let us be like the devil; something will stick." Other questions were answered briefly: Were the Apocrypha considered canonical by the Jews of the primitive church, or only declared such by the Council of Trent? Apocryphal words means spurious words. Some theologians divided the canon of Holy Scripture into books which were genuine, or those admitted by all

to be inspired writings; into books which were mixed, or into such which the majority considered inspired, but which some doubted; and into books called apocryphal which no one considered inspired writings. The canon of inspired writings of Holy Scripture consists of all the books of the Old Testament found in the Alexandrine Codex, and of all the writings of the New Testament which the Council of Carthage in 397 and the Council of Trent in 1546 definitively declared inspired.

Was transubstantiation taught by the primitive church or was not? Transubstantiation, a monk of Corvey, the first advocate of this doctrine! The Catholic Church has ever taught that the substance of wine and bread is changed into the flesh and blood, soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ. St. Ignatius in the first century, St. Justin in the second, Tertullian in the third, St. Ambrose in the fourth, St. Cyril in the fifth, all maintain the same doctrine which was defined in the Council of Trent. If any one deny that the sacrament of the Eucharist contains really, substantially and truly the body, the blood, the soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, let such an one be anathema.

Talked With Principals. A meeting of the public school principals was held at Secretary Bullis's office in the City Hall yesterday afternoon. Secretary Bullis said last night that the meeting was held for the purpose of explaining to the teachers the new monthly, annual and term reports. The reports are made by the principals to Mr. Bullis and include the records of attendance, scholarship, etc. Mr. Bullis said that there had been a few changes made which he desired the teachers to be acquainted with. Mr. Bullis said that there were other school matters talked over, including examinations, etc., and the teachers were told to call at the office this morning for their orders.

Young Priests Will be Examined. The young priests of the Syracuse diocese, who have not been ordained for five years, will be examined by the Diocesan Examining Board at St. John's Academy in North State street, Syracuse, on June 17th. Among the priests who will take the examination are the Rev. J. McCormick, St. John's, Oswego; the Rev. Theodore Provost, Palisadi, and the Rev. George Heister, St. Peter's, Oswego.

### WILL ENLARGE DIAMOND MATCH

To Spend Two Hundred Thousand Dollars Here.

Manager Benton Makes Official Announcement of the Fact Today—Local Builders Preparing Bids for Work—Output of Concern Will be Increased Fifty Per Cent.

Manager Benton, of the Diamond Match Company's plant in this city, officially announced today that the company is to spend \$200,000 in enlarging the factories. Some days ago the Palladium announced such a possibility. Yesterday the matter was fully decided after Mr. W. M. Graves, General Manager of the plants of the Diamond Match Company, whose headquarters are in New York, and Manager-Director Bartholomew, of the match manufacturer, of London, had visited and made a thorough examination of the local premises. The improvement is to consist of an extension to the East end of the main building, 68x125 feet, four stories in height with a basement.

The present structure is six and four stories in height. The addition will make the main building 208 feet in length. The wood working building, 60x125 feet, which is now one story high, is to have three additional stories, making it four stories high. This building is North of the main building. The plans for the improvement have all been prepared, and this morning were placed in the hands of the local contractors to assist them in preparing the figures for the bids. The work is all to be done by local people. The construction will increase the capacity of the Diamond Match Company's plant in this city fifty per cent., and means an increased force of hands employed and the putting in of a large amount of expensive machinery.

The Oswego plant is looked upon by the head office of the Diamond Match Company as one of the principal factories in the combine and for some time there has been a lack of room and facilities for doing the immense amount of work this factory has been called upon to turn out. The introduction of the manufacture of non-phosphorous matches at the factory has so crowded the place that the additions agreed to yesterday became an absolute necessity. The non-phosphorous match has been manufactured with success here, and although Manager Benton declined to discuss the matter, it is thought the addition to the main building will be used almost exclusively for the manufacture of these matches and that in a very short time the phosphorous match will disappear from the market and the matches made by the new process take their place. Just how many additional hands the new building will employ, Mr. Benton refused to say.

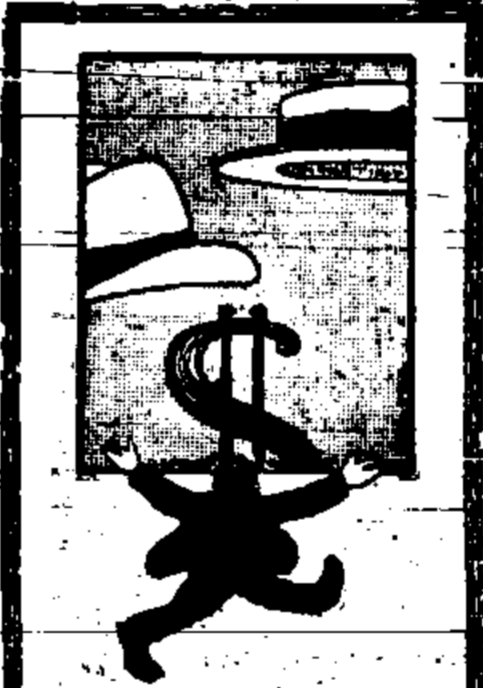

K. Niver, of Syracuse, bought the plant. It might with as much correctness be said that J. Pierpont Morgan is contemplating the purchase. As far as I know the factories will not be sold and my mother will retain ownership."

Mr. Conde would not give the names of any persons who had made offers.

Peter Ballingall, Herbert Mahon and John Gray, expert accountants, who were in the city for several weeks looking over the books at the factory, represented no prospective purchaser, but were here in the employ of Mrs. Conde simply to examine the books of the company and certify to its financial condition and the amount of business transacted.
