OATH AND FACT

The members of the State Senate and Assembly with their hands upon the Holy Bible at Albany yesterday, took the following oath: "I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of New York and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office of Senator or Member of the Assembly according to the best of my ability."
