

MR. O'BRIEN'S SALARY ALLOWED.

Department of Works Held Meeting Last Night.

Mayor Mansfield and Commissioner Mark Ware absent. Mr. Olyphant asks regarding a proposed grade in West First Street.

The regular meeting of the Department of Works was held last night. Mayor Mansfield and Commissioner Fred M. Hart were absent.

Petitions were received from H. D. Ould and others for electric lights on Broadway from Fifth Avenue to the city line and from W. J. Thompson and others for a light at the corner of Liberty and Erie streets.

A petition was received from E. P. Kenzie and others for a sewer in West Seventh between Ulster and Albany streets.

The Superintendent's report and pay roll for the week ending April 15th and 27th shows an expenditure of \$681.07.

The City Engineer was directed to give twenty sidewalk grades.

A communication was read from former Mayor John D. Higgins, now in New York, calling attention of the Department to the fact that the roadway in West Fifth Street from Ellis Street to the Dr. L. & W. tracks is commencing to show wear.

Several years ago the city secured consent from the Secretary of War to dig a ditch across the Fort Ontario reservation, which would drain the water from Ninth and Mitchell streets to the fort ground.

On motion of Mr. Carroll the budget of the Department was adopted as follows: Highway fund, \$21,000; Sidewalk fund, \$1,000; Electric Light fund, \$19,000.

Richard Olyphant appeared before the Department and asked what the Commissioners intend doing in regard to the sidewalk grade in front of the Olyphant bookstore.
