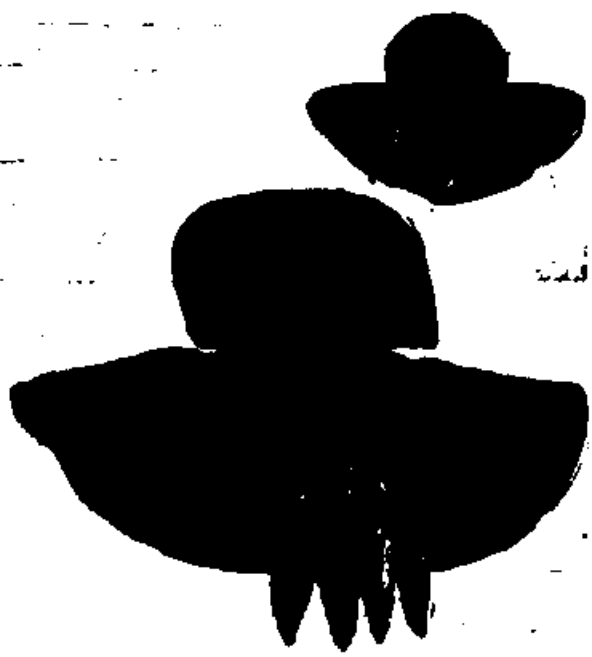

ENCOURAGING REPORTS.

The Y. M. C. A. is Better Off Than a Year Ago.

Now is a Prosperous Condition-Report of the Women's Auxiliary for a Year-A Balance on the Right Side of the Ledger-Reservoir Book to be Issued.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors, of the Y. M. C. A., was held last night and routine business was transacted.

Encouraging reports were read by the Chairman of the various committees. That of the Finance Committee was especially interesting and the committee will meet during the last portion of the week to prepare a financial statement for the public.

Following is the annual report of the Women's Auxiliary to the Y. M. C. A. of Oswego, N. Y., for the year ending December 31st, 1900:

We have a membership, active and associate, of forty-seven. (The larger portion of these being associate) During the year we have elected three new members, we have lost one associate member by death, Mrs. L. B. Ponsness, one active member by removal from town, Mrs. F. J. Clark, several by resignation, and some names have been dropped because of apparent lack of interest.

We have greatly missed our valued Treasurer, Miss H. M. Hubbard, but Miss Worra has ably filled her place with the books. There have been held three regular and three called meetings. The average attendance upon the regular meetings has been ten; the largest meeting, fifteen were present, and the smallest, five. It was intended this year to reconstruct and reorganize our constitution, but this matter has not yet been consummated.

It does not wish this coming year. In January last the auxiliary gave the Association \$100 toward their bank year. At the same time they assumed a \$300 note of bank indebtedness of the Association which they met with interest in June. In April a concert was given in the M. E. church. In July a dinner was given in Deep Rock Hotel at which time the ladies were very successful. In December \$4 was given toward the State work.

In November a birthday party was given by the gentlemen of the Association, one of our members, Mrs. E. G. Post, opening her house for the same, and the Auxiliary did its usual share of this work. On election night the Auxiliary opened a room in the Deep Rock Hotel, where coffee and sandwiches were served at a nominal price. Many were served and much gratification was felt with the effort. It was no done merely as a money-making scheme, but in the hope that some would find here warmth, welcome and good cheer, rather than in some less desirable place. In December the Auxiliary issued its usual annual calendar.

The Association having moved into new quarters during the year the Auxiliary gave expression to their good wishes for the coming year in the shape of a large flag and a growing plant for the rooms, which were presented at the time of the New Year's reception. The new year is entered upon with some plans for coming work.

They have some plans for a souvenir book of Oswego history to be issued the early part of the coming year. They hope to broaden their borders by the formation of a Junior Auxiliary.

THE GALLANT NINTH.

Officers Who are on Duty With the Regiment in Feltin.

The PALLADIUM has had frequent inquiries regarding the whereabouts of officers who went to the Philippines and to China with the Ninth Infantry. All were well known in this neighborhood and many of them had been stationed at Fort Ontario. The following officers are on duty with the regiment in Feltin: Colonel U. F. Robe, Lieutenant-Colonel O. A. Crockett, Major M. O. Fouts and K. E. Robertson; Captains R. L. Dadda, O. R. Noyes, R. H. Anderson, F. L. Palmer, A. W. Brewster, F. D. W. Ramsey, M. L. Harnsey, J. M. Sigworth, E. V. Bookmiller and F. H. Schofield; First Lieutenants K. A. Bumpus, T. W. Connell, J. F. Drouillard, J. B. Schiefel, E. R. Gibson, H. Hammond, E. M. Hartburn, Jr., O. C. Kinsey, F. L. Hunsdon, B. F. Hinkle, W. K. Wajis, L. O. Welborn and U. S. Stmonds; Second Lieutenants: R. A. Clark, W. F. Coleman, P. M. Goodrich, A. U. Koch, G. W. Walker, Alex. Smith, Jr., Ensign T. Smith, and Boston Smith. This is a comparatively well-officered regiment there being about only one Major, four Captains, eight First Lieutenants, and two Second Lieutenants. No regiment in the Philippines can show a similar list of officers present for duty.

The Major who is absent is Major Hagan, who was twice wounded in the assault on the gates of Feltin. He was sent home and for several weeks was in a hospital at San Francisco. Early he was sent to duty and ordered to Fort bloom. Major Hagan was for a long time commuted to Fort Ontario. He was with the regiment in Cuba, and he participated in the taking of Santiago, went with the regiment to the Philippines and to China. Other officers who are now at Fort Ontario are Captain F. L. Dadda, Captain G. R. Noyes, Captain Robert H. Anderson, Lieutenants H. Hammond and R. E. Clark.

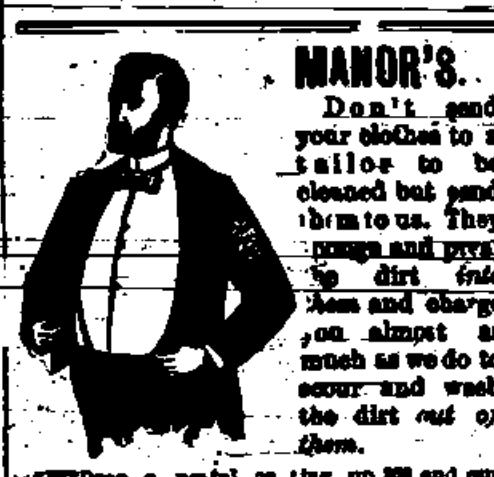
