Horton, however, at his finishing, had been driven at the limit of six minutes, and his unexpected exhibition of endurance was one of the surprises of the contest. He had made the pace so fast that Edward Forrest, the champion of the Oronogo sports field, who finished in fifth place, just behind Horton, broke the record for the course. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION. New Teachers Will Be Appointed Next Saturday. The absence of President Morehouse from the city prevented a regular meeting of the Department of Education last night. Superintendent Bullis said that a meeting would probably be held on Saturday afternoon next. Mr. Bullis said that the new appointments to teaching positions would be made at that meeting, but who they are to be would not state at present. The members of the Department have, it is understood, approved of the appointments, including that of Miss Tucker as teacher of French at the Oronogo High school. Miss Francis Delaney, now acting as substitute at Senior No. 6, and Miss Augusta Volkmer and Miss Nellie Whaley are said to be the appointees in place of the teachers who recently resigned, namely: Miss Sarah S. Grant, Senior No. 5; Miss Lucy Smith, Junior No. 7; Miss Nellie R. Crockett, Hamilton, Junior No. 4; these are several teachers to be made and there is possibility of a change being made in the list of proposed appointees. The resolutions of the Carpenters' Union in regard to Secretary Bullis putting in new desks at the Normal school and asking that a definition be made from his salary for the time he spent in the work, will be presented and probably other resolutions matters will come up probably. The public schools will open on Monday morning next. The supplies are now being delivered at the Secretary's office.

COURT AT PULASKI. Judge Stewart Adjourned the Term Until Thursday. The September term of the County Court was convened here yesterday and an adjournment taken until Thursday. Charles Coble, of Constantine, charged with the offense of selling liquor to a minor under eighteen years of age, and another for selling liquor to a minor on Sunday, pleaded guilty to the third, selling liquor to a minor, and was fined \$50 or fifty days in jail. Frank Keltner, of Oswego, charged with grand larceny in the second degree, withdrew his former plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty to the same offense. Sentence was deferred until the next term of court. Keltner was indicted for stealing rope from a coalboat in Oswego, owned by Patrick McMahon. He alleged that he had been employed by a man named Sullivan who was in charge of the boat to assist him in carrying the rope to a junk shop, to be paid at the rate of thirty cents an hour for his services. He received for the work sixty cents, Sullivan is in jail in Oswego.
