ANOTHER JUSTICE NEEDED.

He won his title of General in the field fighting for the freedom of his country. He was a candidate for President when Juarez was elected the second time. He would have had an unbroken tenure of office except that the conscription of his country forced him to succeed himself after his first term of four years. However, from 1880 to

Diaz practically dominated the affairs of the country and the constitution was changed so that he could again assume the reins of government and keep them.

For a generation Diaz has been Mexico and during that time the country has developed and become a progressive, well-ordered Republic. The old tradition of revolution has been lost. Big game and foreign invasions and weak central governments have been suppressed. The national credit of the country has been established and stands high. A good railroad system has been established and industry and commerce have thrived. Compulsory education has been enforced. The manner in which President Diaz has conducted the affairs of Mexico, judging by the fruits of his administration, shows him to be one of the greatest statesmen of the Nineteenth and Twentieth Centuries.

It was supposed that Senator Ramon Corral, the Vice-President, would succeed Diaz when the latter's term expired, but it looks as though he intends to hold on as long as he lives. Already there has been speculation as to what next human being General Don Porfirio will name as his successor.

Miss Ida E. Austin was given a linen abdomen, which she has since worn. She was married to Samuel J. Cross, Red Creek, on April 21st.

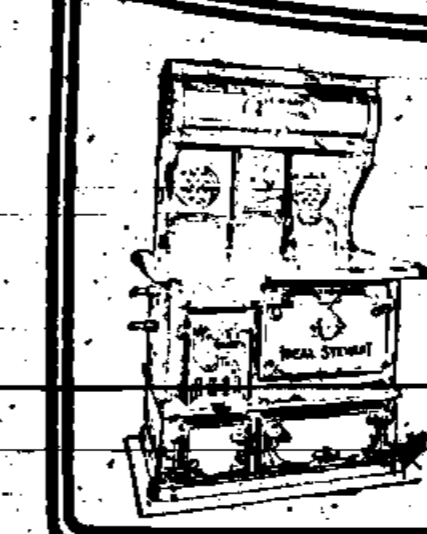
