BARGE CANAL NEARING END

Will be Ready for Navigation Two Years From Now.

The Oswego Division and That Section East From Three Rivers to the Hudson Scheduled for Completion Next Year—Some Doubt About That, However.

According to the March Bulletin of the Barge Canal, the Almahar Contracting Company has their contract in this city within nine per cent of completion. The work was started by the Gilmore-Horton Contracting Company in the Spring of 1907, six years ago, the time limit being four years. The original contract was for \$728,682. The amount paid on the work up to March 1st was \$656,240.

The Fulton contracts, 10-10-a and 10-b, which were started in 1905, range from 48.7 to 88.5 per cent of completion. These contracts were originally known as Contract No. 10, but have been thrown up on two or three occasions and relet.

Contract No. 37, which includes the new high dam and which extends to the Fulton city line, awarded to H. P. Burghard for \$2,267,956, is being finished by the Walter Bradley Contracting Company and is 58.8 per cent completed.

The contracts on the Erie branch of Fulton, known as contracts 89, excavating through Highsville cut-off, 108, 104, concrete bridges over canal at Phoenix and Fulton Broadway, are under construction.

At present there is completed 140 miles of the improved barge canal. Speaking of the Oswego canal the Bulletin says: "The barge canal between the Hudson river and the city of Oswego on Lake Ontario, the terminus of the Oswego canal, will be complete and in readiness for navigation in 1914."

THE GETTYSBURG CELEBRATION.

Arrangements Completed For Entertainment of Veterans.

The Battle of Gettysburg Commission has completed arrangements for the celebration of the 45th anniversary of the occasion. Colonel J. H. Schounmaker, of Pittsburgh, chairman of the commission, says:

"Only veterans of the Civil War may be provided with food, shelter and entertainment within the camp at the battlefield. Therefore no woman, child or man not a veteran will be accommodated, nor will veterans accompanied by any of these be accommodated, as it is expressly prohibited. Therefore no veteran should bring to Gettysburg any members of his family unless he has at first obtained accommodations for them at the hotels of the town, as the camp here will be the worst that the historic town has ever known."

The commission has provided 5,000 tents for the 40,000 honorably discharged veterans of the Civil War. Eight men will be assigned to a tent. All the soldiers will eat and live under the conditions that brought them to the battlefield fifty years ago, except that the two great armies are to be kept apart with each other and sleep under the same canvas.

Tents will be ready for occupancy on the evening of June 20th, when the first meal will be served, and they will remain open until July 6th, when the camp will break.

The program calls for veterans' day on July 1st, military day on July 2nd, civic day on July 3rd and national day on July 4th.

CAN'T CUT TIMBER.

Salmon River Power Company Succeeds in Getting Injunction Modified. The dispute between Byron O. Horton and the Salmon River Power Company was up before Justice Emerson at Watertown Saturday. Udelle Bartlett represented Mr. Horton and asked that the injunction restraining the company from entering upon its lands be continued. The dispute is over the ownership of Bonast Island, in the Salmon river, which was left out of a deed given to the power company by Mr. Horton some time ago.

Justice Emerson directed that the cutting of timber must cease, letting the injunction stand as far as it refers to the cutting of timber and the occupancy of the house, but vacating the injunction as to the occupancy of the island and the modification of the defendant to give a bond sufficient to restore the island to its present condition if the ownership of the property should be determined to be in Mr. Horton's possession.

FULL POWER TO MR. HIGGINS

Water Department Ready to Waive Claim Against the State.

Action Taken at a Special Meeting of the Water Department Held at the City Hall Saturday Night—Resolution to be Part of Brief to Canal Board.

Full power to represent the Water Department in the High dam proceeding was given to Mr. John D. Higgins at a special meeting of that department held Saturday night. Mr. Higgins presented a communication to the department stating that he was preparing a brief for presentation to the Canal Board giving the city's views on the power question and reiterating former statements that the city would still accept the surplus flow of the water in lieu of money damages for destruction of power at the old High dam. Mr. Higgins desired to get the matter in writing and the following resolution to that effect was presented by Commissioner Farrell and unanimously adopted. The claim of the city, if made, will be in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000. There has been but one claim filed at present for lands at the Country Club site taken by the State. This claim is for \$1,002,000. No claim has been made for the present High dam property. This, it is expected, will be \$2,000,000 more if filed. The resolution adopted is as follows:

"Resolved, That the city of Oswego, N. Y., represented by the Department of Water in the negotiations with the State of New York and its officials having charge of the construction of the barge canal so-called, have at all times deemed it to the advantage of the city of Oswego that it should have water-power to be developed at the new High dam from the total flow of the river, rather than to resort to money damages from the State for the destruction of the city's power at the old High dam or elsewhere, and have conducted all its negotiations with the State on this basis.

"The Department hereby confirms this policy toward the State with respect to said water-power, and hereby authorizes and directs J. D. Higgins on behalf of this Department to make and confirm the proposal and offer to the State of New York, to its Canal Board or to any other board or office of the State having to do with the matter. That if the said new High dam No. 6 shall be constructed by the State at the location and as now planned, with the bulkhead at the western end only, and sufficient capacity to economically pass for power development the total flow of the river at that point, then in that case it is hereby declared to be the purpose of this Department that the city shall not prosecute claims against the State for loss sustained by reason of the destruction of the water power in the Oswego river, belonging to the city of Oswego, or if any such claims shall for any reason be formulated and filed, be waived, settled and satisfied according to law; and further

"Resolved, That should the State make any changes in the location of the plans of said new high dam, whereby the rights and privileges hereinbefore described are in any manner diverted, lessened or diminished, then all offers, proposals, tenders or waivers made under authority of this resolution shall be of no force or effect, and the same shall therefore become inoperative and void."
