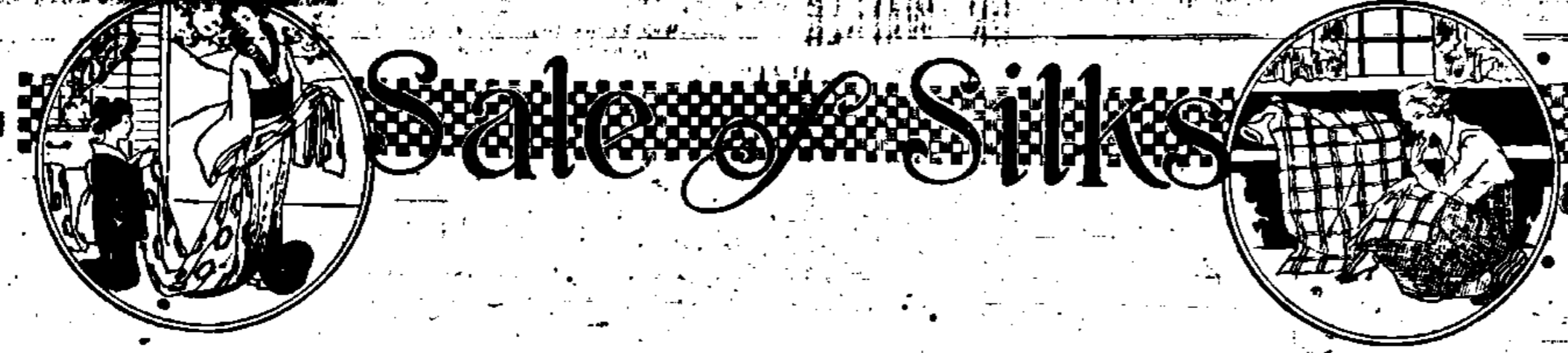

Changes in Harbor Lights

Notice to mariners, issued by the Lighthouse Department, says: On the opening of navigation in 1917, the following changes will be made in the lights at Oswego harbor: Oswego Breakwater Light will be changed to fixed white of 2,900 candlepower, to be known hereafter as Oswego Light. Oswego Inner Light, fixed red, of fifty candlepower, will be established twenty-eight feet above the water in the vicinity of the present Oswego Light tower.
