A \$16,000 VERDICT

Obtained by William D. Bailey Against the R. W. & O.—A Suit Settled.

URICA, January 10.—In the case of William D. Bailey vs. the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad Company before Judge Vann yesterday the jury rendered a verdict awarding the plaintiff damages in the amount of \$16,000. The jury occupied scarcely an hour in its deliberations. Bailey was a brakeman on the road in August, 1893, when the accident occurred out of which the suit grew. He was engaged in setting a brake on a flat car at DeKalb junction, when, as alleged, the brake gave way and he was thrown down between the cars. Bailey was dragged a distance of 150 feet and had one leg cut off, besides sustaining other injuries. It was alleged that the accident was due to the negligence of the railroad company in not keeping the brake appliances in good order. The defense was that Bailey had opportunity to know of the condition of the brake, and, being guilty of contributory negligence, could not recover damages. It was also denied by the defense that the accident occurred in the manner alleged. An attempt was made to show that Bailey slipped and thus fell. The case has been in litigation since January, 1893.

On the first trial the plaintiff secured a verdict of \$10,000. This was reversed by the General Term. On the next trial a verdict of \$8,000 was awarded the plaintiff. The case was again carried to the General Term and again the verdict was reversed. On the third trial the defense obtained a non-suit. From this the plaintiff appealed to the Court of Appeals, where the unanimous opinion of the court was given reversing the judgment in favor of defendant and ordering a new trial. This trial was therefore the fourth one. It is likely that there will be an appeal from this verdict, as A. M. Beardsley, attorney for the railroad, asked for the usual stay pending appeal. Scripture & Backus have been the attorneys for Bailey throughout the litigation.

URICA, Jan. 11.—In the Circuit Court before Judge Vann and a jury yesterday, the trial of an action arising out of an accident on the Ontario & Western railroad in West Utica, was commenced. On the evening of July 23d, 1892, James W. Costello, Joseph B. Clobber and Frank M. Clobber left New Hartford on a railroad tricycle to come to this city. While they were passing through the yards in West Utica the tricycle was run down by engine No. 25, running light from Clinton to this city. Costello and Frank M. Clobber were killed, while Joseph B. Clobber escaped. The plaintiff claims that the engine was running backwards, without lights on the tender, the bell was not rung, and that the engine was going at an unlawful rate of speed. It is also alleged that the defendant was aware that Costello was in the habit of riding on the road on his tricycle, and is guilty of gross negligence. Plaintiff asks for \$5,000 damages. The defense is that Costello had no right upon the company's track with the tricycle.

Charles Bassett, who lost a leg while running an engine on the Adirondack railroad, about a year ago, and who brought suit against the company, has settled his claim. He gets \$5,000 and a position as engineer of a shifting engine guaranteed for eight years. Bassett's son, who was fireman on the road, and was discharged when the accident occurred, goes back on the road.

LAWYER LESTER'S ROBE.

He Thinks He Has Located it in Levi Brown's Barn.

On December 21st last Lawyer D. P. Lester bought a lap robe of Barnes, the barter, and the same day the robe disappeared. After a search Mr. Lester thought he had located the robe in Levi Brown's livery stable in East Bridge street. Yesterday afternoon a search warrant was sworn out by Mr. Lester, and a robe answering the description of that owned by Mr. Lester was taken from Mr. Brown's stable. This morning the robe was awarded to Mr. Lester as Mr. Brown did not put in appearance at Police Court. Afterward Mr. Brown appeared and claimed the robe, alleging that he had bought it in Filton of A. Bristol four years ago and that he had put a mark upon it. Mr. Lester agreed to reopen the case and give Mr. Brown a chance to prove his claim, at the same time expressing a determination to prosecute the parties who are to blame for its theft.

Canadian Items.
