GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

STATE OF NEW YORK,
Executive Chamber,
Albany, January 6, 1890.

In obedience to the constitution, I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the Governor of the State of New York, for the year ending September 30, 1889.

The year just closed has been one of increased prosperity and encouragement. With the resumption of specie payments by the national government, and the restoration of a sound financial basis, there has been marked improvement in all business affairs. Harvest conditions are satisfactory, and the current of industrial activity, and willing hands have found employment. Ample crops have found eager markets, and agricultural interests have abundantly prospered. There has been unusual exemption from disease, while peace and good order have prevailed with us in our borders. Indeed, we have been blessed with such a season of thanksgiving. May we, as a people, have a realizing sense of gratitude, for the Divine favor so generously bestowed upon us.

TAXATION.

For the fiscal year 1879, the tax levy was at the rate of 2.05 on 1000 mills, which is expected to produce the sum of \$7,000,000.00, while that of the previous year being at the rate of 1.90 on 1000 mills, produced the sum of \$6,541,397.00.
