OSWEGO COUNTY PEOPLE ON TRIAL FOR MURDER AT MORRISVILLE.

The trial of Charles J. Myers and his wife Georgina for the murder of their infant child was opened in the Madison County Court of Osgo and terminated at Morrisville yesterday. The case has attracted a great deal of interest both here and Oswego.
