## TRIED TO PASS RAISED BILL

### Police Believe "Mrs. Jane Brown" Member of Gang Which Has Flooded Country With Raised Bills.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—Mrs. Jane Brown, charged with attempting to pass a \$20 bill, "raised" to \$50 today proved a woman of mystery when she was arraigned before United States Commissioner Samuel Hitchcock.

The woman was arrested when she attempted to pass the "raised" bill on a sales girl in Gimbel Brothers department store. She was remanded to the Tombs by Commissioner Hitchcock, in lieu of \$5,000 bond, to await a further hearing Tuesday before United States Commissioner Shields.

Throughout the preliminary hearing today the woman steadfastly refused to tell anything about herself. "I'll give you no information, and I'll do for yourselves," she repeatedly answered to all questions. Asked if she had a lawyer, she said no; that she couldn't hire one. She said she had no friends she could appeal to, and when the authorities offered to hire a lawyer, she broke down crying, and said, "What's the use? I won't have one. It is all right as it is."

The police, because of the woman's refusal to say anything about herself, said today they are convinced that she is a member of a counterfeiting gang which has flooded the country with "raised" bills to the amount of many thousands of dollars. The principal bill the gang is passing is a \$20 bank note "raised" to \$50.

## BODY OF HEADLESS WOMAN FOUND ON COAL BARGE

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Jan. 10.—The headless body of a woman, identified as that of Annie Walsh, aged thirty, was found by the police in a bunk on the coal barge Snipe at its dock here early today.

Captain Charles Matrony, of Bristol, who the police claim they found crouching dazed in a corner of the cabin with a rope around his neck, was arrested. He admitted he was drinking, but denied knowledge of the crime.

Louis Therrien, accompanied by his twenty-year-old daughter, reported the murder.

Matrony broke down later, the police state, and admitted that "he might have committed the murder."

Both men were arraigned today and it was expected both would be held by the Grand Jury. Matrony charged with three murder and Therrien held as a witness.

## EMERALD BALL CALLED OFF.

Has Been Annual Social Function of Brooklyn for Seventy-five Years.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The Emerald Ball, for seventy-five years the annual social function of Brooklyn and one of the most famous dances in the country, will not be held this year. Opposition of the Catholic clergy to the tango, trot and one-step is the cause. The ball was scheduled for February 2d, at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Puzzled by the fact that no invitations had yet been issued, Brooklynites today investigated and found that the 1914 ball will not be held.

The orphan asylums and other Catholic charitable institutions have for three-quarters of a century looked to the Emerald Association's annual big affair for the chief portion of their necessary funds.

## TWO BURNED TO DEATH IN BINGHAMTON FIRE.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Jan. 10.—Two unidentified men were burned to death in the storehouse of the H. C. Stone & Sons' chemical works here early today.

The entire section of the town in the vicinity of the storehouse was threatened for a time. Chemicals and explosives stored in the building made the work of fighting the blaze extremely hazardous. There were numerous explosions which threw flaming debris high into the air.

The blaze is believed to have been of incendiary origin. The loss is estimated at \$10,000.

## TO EXAMINE PLANT.

Justice Devendorf Grants an Order to Inspect Furaska Paper Company's Plant.

Justice Devendorf yesterday granted an order to S. J. Kelly, of Syracuse, giving him permission to have experts examine the plant of the Furaska Paper Company, of Fulton, with the view of preparing a case in an action for damages brought by Catherine Borow, as administratrix of the estate of Joseph Borow, who was killed at the plant of the Fulton company. The matter came up on an order to show cause obtained from Justice Andrews and the petition alleged that the Fulton concern had refused permission for an inspection of the plant. The order reads that the paper company may have an expert there at the same time.

## SEVEN MEN, THREE OF THEM WHITE, LASHED AT WHIPPING POST IN WILMINGTON, DEL.

WILMINGTON, Del., Jan. 10.—Seven men, three of them white, were lashed at the workhouse here today. The whippings were witnessed by a large crowd. Warden Crawford, who piled the lash, laid on a total of 100 strokes on the seven lashed backs. Those whipped were: Robert Dempson, 20 lashes; John Beebe, 10 lashes; Jeremiah Kelleher, 40 lashes; Henry Cault, 20 lashes; Joseph Brown, 10 lashes; Benjamin Williams, 20 lashes; and George Vincent, 10 lashes.

The men had been convicted of larceny and highway robbery and they will serve sentences of from two months to two years.

## TO EXTEND LINE.

New Trolley Road to Connect Auburn and Geneva.

GENEVA FALLS, Jan. 10.—Formal announcement has been made by W. Atwood, General Superintendent of the Geneva, Falls & Auburn Railroad Company, that the road will be extended to Auburn during the coming year if the necessary franchise can be secured.

The Geneva, Seneca Falls & Auburn road now consists of about sixteen miles of track from Cayuga Lake Park, Geneva, and several miles of city line.

To secure the benefit of direct connections to the East the road will have to be built sixteen miles to Auburn, crossing Cayuga Lake, touching the village of Cayuga, and connecting with northern trolley lines at Auburn.
