WANT A NEW STORAGE PLANT

Fruit Growers Discuss the Question Today.

Bear That Rock-Ster Syndicate Will Put in \$50,000 of Oswego County Growers Will Subscribe for \$25,000 Worth of Stock Additional.

With the largest attendance ever recorded at a meeting of the Oswego County Fruit Growers' Association, the members tackled the question of the construction of a modern cold storage plant in this city at the morning session at the Courthouse today, and out of the discussion it is thought that something tangible may come in the near future.

President Russell Quince opened the meeting and Secretary J.K. Prosser explained various proposals that had been made in relation to a plant here. Through Professor H. S. Lavery he said that the association was in touch with a syndicate of Rochester cold storage men who had tentatively agreed to put \$50,000 into a chemical plant in this city provided the fruit growers would subscribe for \$25,000 worth of stock, which would keep them interested in the project. Ralph Pierce, of Oswego, one of the leaders in the agitation for a cold storage plant, stated that he had secured a North Rose, told of the success of the plants at that place and at Red Creek. Each takes care of 28,000 barrels of apples and each has made money from the time they were put in operation. A new \$125,000 plant at Sodas was also pronounced a success. Practically all of the members of the association engaged in the informal discussion followed and the general sentiment favored a modern plant constructed with regard to railroad facilities.

M.W. Cole, of the State Agricultural Department, arrived this afternoon to push along the storage proposition, and a committee will be named to take charge of the plan of securing a plant. Dr. Donald Reddick, of Ithaca, was also on the program this afternoon, talking on diseases and their treatment. Officers were elected as follows: President, F. A. Pierce; Vice-President, Ralph M. Pierce; Secretary, John Copeland; and Treasurer, Norman C. White.

Afternoon Session.
The crowd at the meeting this afternoon was so large that the Special Term room would not hold it. It practically decided to form a co-operative buying association following a suggestion made by Mr. Cole and while some opposition developed to the cold storage plant on the ground that the growers were not quite ready for it, it is expected a committee will get at the proposition as soon as possible.

The funeral of Cadwell B. Benson was held from the family home in Milwaukee this afternoon. Nearly every manufacturing establishment and business house in this city was represented and hundreds paid their last respects to a man whom they honored and respected. In the large reception room, in a casket of mahogany and bronze, reposed the body of Mr. Benson, white beautiful flowers were in profusion, tributes from many friends.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. David Willis, Jr., of Astoria, L. I., assisted by the Rev. Dr. W. S. Steele, pastor of Grace church. In their remarks both clergymen spoke of the high character of the man who he held in the community, of the good he did of his open-handed charity to those who appealed to him and of the institutions in which he was interested. The body was borne to a private funeral car, the Empire, which left Milwaukee and accompanied by the pallbearers was taken to Riverside cemetery accompanied by many friends. There the body was placed in the Benson mausoleum.

The pallbearers were grand-nephews Granger Benson and Byron Arnold, George Keeney and Oral Keeney, Elizabeth N. J. Waldo Emerson, Titusville, Pa., Alanson S. Page and Benson Page, of this city.
