Will Inspect Milk Plants. FULTON, April 6.—The Board of Health has perfected a system whereby it hopes to secure strictly sanitary measures regarding the sale of milk and meat.

Under the new rules persons who wish to deal in these foods are required to take out a license which may be procured of the City Clerk for \$1 for each day.

MARINE

Captain Magill, one of the largest vessel owners on the lakes died in Chicago Tuesday.

The tug H. Mowry which was rebuilt at Tonawanda during the winter was launched yesterday and has been renamed the John Mabar after the President of the American Engine and Boiler Company.

DETROIT, Mich., April 4.—While en route from Montague to Manistee this morning the engine of the tug Sprite broke down and the boat was driven on the beach, where she is rapidly going to pieces. A heavy sea was on when the accident occurred and the anchor chains parted. Captain Robinson and his crew were rescued.

A dispatch from Charlevoix says the tug Wessex, in command of E. S. Small, caught fire in Pias Lake Monday night and burned to the water's edge. The hull sank. The crew reached shore with the ice this morning.

Pictou Times: Captain Peter O. Ostrander died at his residence, Queen Street, Monday morning. About ten days previous to his death Captain Ostrander was stricken with paralysis and gradually sank until the end came. Since August, 1902, the captain has been a severe sufferer. About that time, while in command of his schooner, the Queen of the Lakes, he met with a serious accident. Just outside of the harbor at Toronto some part of the rigging of the vessel gave way and the large boom fell on the captain, causing a double fracture of the right leg and breaking several ribs. He was taken to the General Hospital in Toronto, where he remained for a year and a half, most of the time on his back in bed, while his injured limb required resting several times. In the spring of 1904, Captain Ostrander had so far recovered as to be able to come to Pictou, where he took up his residence. He never fully recovered from the accident, however, and it was with the greatest difficulty that he made his way about the house.

To add to his troubles, the captain's only son, Emory, fell from the rail of the Queen of the Lakes at Charlotte, about the 25th of September, 1902, and was drowned. Emory Ostrander was twenty-three years of age, and a school teacher, but after the accident to his father, gave up his school and sailed on the schooner. Captain Ostrander was fifty-seven years of age and was a Mason and a member of Pictou Lodge, A. O. U. W.

Hotel Property Sold. PULASKI, April 6.—Lyzec D. C. Bunch has sold his interest in the Salmon River Hotel property on the East side of Jefferson Avenue in this village, which includes the large vacant lot North of the hotel building, to David R. Bates of Hudson Point, Wayne County. Charles Coon, landlord of the Salmon River House, has a lease of the building which does not expire until next December, and for which the new purchaser of the property is negotiating. Mr. Bates contemplates making extensive changes to the property. The consideration is not made public.

Teachers' Examinations. PULASKI, April 6.—A teachers' examination for uniform, elementary and academic certificates will be held at the Mexico High School building April 18 and 14. School Commissioner H. Irving Platt, of Orwell, representing the Third Commissioner District of Oswego County, announces that for any of the standings required for third grade, second grade or first grade certificates the candidates may submit an examination in the same subject earned in Regents' examinations subsequent to November 1, 1904, provided the candidate was at that time at least fifteen years old. The program of examinations will be as follows:

Thursday morning—Arithmetic, geography, drawing, history of education. Afternoon—English composition, grammar, physiology and hygiene, current topics.

Friday morning—American history, algebra, bookkeeping, orthography. (Afternoon—Civil government, cobalt law, physics, methods and school management, reading.
